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

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A Letter from The Clergy

Hello!

My name is Sarah Haslam, I am 47 years old, currently living in Brimscombe and am at the end of my curacy. I have three children: Noah (15), Hope (13) and Elijah (10), and my older brother Symon lives not a million miles away in Tetbury.

As part of discerning where God might be calling me to serve as a priest next, I am on a long leadership placement here in the Beacon benefice. In between juggling churches and children, I love swimming, comedy, walking, singing, spas, and nights out with my friends, and reading and jigsaws when I need a bit of quiet time.

Before training for the ministry included working in publishing in London for many years, before returning to the Cotswolds and working as a freelance motoring journalist - among other things!

Three children later, and just as I was thinking about returning to work full time, I felt God calling me to become a vicar. It was an enormous shock, to say the least! However, when I spoke to the curate at my church, she said 'of course! I can't believe I didn't spot it!' By 'it' she meant my calling.

Priesthood is very much a vocation, a calling, like teaching or nursing. And like teaching or nursing, you need training. After spending time with a vocation's advisor at the diocese, I was put forward to go to a selection committee, where it is decided if you are priest material or not. Somehow, they said yes.

Two years at vicar school followed, which was hard work, but I absolutely loved it. I studied at Wycliffe Hall, a theological college that is part of the University of Oxford, before serving my three-year curacy just the other side of Stroud in the Benefice of Brimscombe, Woodchester and Rodborough.

The day I found out I had been accepted for ordination training someone asked me how it felt, and I said that I felt as though I had been 'set free to love'. That is what priesthood is all about for me: loving God, and loving people, wherever God leads me to be.

Which brings me to *this* fabulous part of the Cotswolds. I cannot believe what a warm welcome I have received, so my first thought is thank you! I am very much still in the getting to know you phase, and it's a big place, so it will take time. If we haven't yet met, do please say hello when you see me and invite me in, or out, for a cuppa!

OneDiocese blog: Living out faith through sustainable fashion

Madiy Warner, from the Diocese of Gloucester, shares how selling unwanted clothing online fuelled a complete change in her view of fast fashion and her mission to actively seek sustainable alternatives.

I was about the furthest thing from a sustainable shopper until I discovered second-hand clothing apps, such as Depop and Vinted. Over the months that followed, I slowly noticed my shopping habits start to change as I became more aware of the impact of fast fashion.

After learning that the fashion industry is responsible for 8–10% of global emissions, and that it takes 10,000 litres of water to make a pair of jeans, I became conscious of the huge environmental impact of the clothes we buy.

Combining this with the appalling treatment and conditions of garment workers, I came to the decision that I would prioritise buying second-hand or sustainable clothing whenever possible.

I created an Instagram account (@ethical_wardrobe) to share my progress and what I've been learning with others and took part in Tearfund's 30-day fashion fast where I wore the same 10 items of clothing during March 2022.

This fundraising activity allowed me to bring God into my sustainable fashion journey. Knowing that the money I raised was used to help vulnerable communities around the world adapt to the climate crisis and lift themselves out of poverty – poverty the fast fashion industry is guilty of fuelling – really brought me closer to God and allowed me to live out Proverbs 29:7, 'The righteous care about justice for the poor'.

If you're interested in sustainable fashion but not sure where to start, I have a few tricks that helped me:

Shop second-hand: start using Depop or Vinted when looking online for clothing, before going to fast fashion retailers.

Support sustainable brands: look for brands that prioritise sustainability and ethical production practices. These brands often use eco-friendly materials and have transparent supply chains, and pay their workers fair wages.

Buy less and choose well: practice mindful consumption by trying to only buy clothes when you need them. When shopping, choose versatile pieces that can be worn in many ways.

Rent your wardrobe: instead of buying new clothes for a special occasion, use a site such as Rent the Runway to hire clothing for an event.

Repair your items: it's never too late to learn how to do small repairs on worn-out items of clothing. This can significantly extend the life of your clothes and helps to reduce waste.

Facing up to Father

A talk given by David Worlock to the Cranham Local History Society on 16th March

David is a farmer's son who back in the day won a scholarship to Cambridge to read history. He began with his thoughts on history – almost a lecture, but full of wisdom. More on this later. He then took us back to a farm, near Nibley, down Chipping Sodbury way, and to his father, from a family which had been farming for over three hundred years. We have David, wanting to please but enjoying Latin, and history, and his father asking him – why? Why not be a farmer? He'd never get a job as anything else... As a child he was expected to help out, before and after school, and his first job was washing cows' udders. He would run errands for the farm workers. A canny shopkeeper sold cigarettes singly. David saved to buy The Eagle comic. Newspaper images at the time of the Suez crisis appalled him.

David's dad loved farming – and foxhunting. Three days a week in winter. The pursuit of adrenaline, rather than the foxes, David decided. His father was a jumping man: of modern huntsmen he was scornful, they trotted around, waiting for people to open gates for them. David himself was put in a horse at an early age but books and history were his first love. His father, finally relenting, agreed he could stay on at school if he promised to learn three things: how to lay a hedge, build a Cotswold stone wall, and make a haha. David has little time for stonewallers who cap their walls with concrete.

'Skills' was one of David's headings for his talk. Another was 'judgement', which meant learning the composition of an animal, the way 'bone and meat interact'. 'Critch', his grandmother's lover as David described him (his grandad had died from the Spanish flu in 1918), ran the auction at Gloucester Market, 'a theatre of public performance'. Even as a teenager David, wishing to keep onside with his father, was judging pigs. He was the 1963 'Gloucester Supreme Champion Bacon Pig Judge'.

A final heading, 'society', took in the Duke of Beaufort and 'Beaufortshire' and its 58,000 acres, his royal connections, the Badminton horse trials, and David's dad as a tenant farmer, employed in his black jacket 'to whistle pedestrians off the course', especially where they gathered near the 'coffin' and the 'quarry' where riders were frequently unseated. There were also lesser aristocrats, and David helped out as a guide at Dyrham Park, one-time home of the Blathwayt family. David met there one of his heroes, the writer and diarist, James Lees Milne, who had persuaded many landowners to avoid disaster by handing their homes over to the National Trust, some 300 in David's estimation.

We were near the end, but not quite, of David's story. I've reversed David's order by putting the stories first. He'd begun with an impassioned argument for the importance of history. We lose our perspective if we lose sight of our history. History changes with every generation, and it's our duty to record our own, to get the record down. He's scornful of historians who make claims about restoring the glories of the past. (He had one in particular in mind. No name mentioned). As for modern educators, they've 'moved history to the edge of the national curriculum'. Trench warfare and the wives of Henry VIII are all pupils learn about.

And finally, in answer to a question, who had most left their mark on the young David, the answer was his tutor, Herbert Butterfield, Regius Professor at Cambridge, a chain-smoking Yorkshireman. Appalled by one of his essays he'd sent the young David off to the British Museum and the Public Record Office to look at letters and papers relating to an incident on Kew Bridge, in 1761, when the carriages of the newly-crowned king, George III, and his prime minister, the Duke of Newcastle, both claiming precedence, got stuck coming in opposite directions across the bridge. King and PM were not on the same side about the war currently in progress, but they got together while they waited and found common ground. The Duke remained in office and the Earl of Bute, representing the anti-war party, was brought in... and the war championed by William Pitt continued, and, as the letters suggested, and as David learnt, all was briefly in harmony.

All in all, talk to remember. One of the best. A big thank you to David.

The Garden Society has two events in April. On Saturday 1st April – yes, April Fool's Day! – we hold our Annual General Meeting and Lunch, details of which have been sent out to members. Our annual Plant Sale and Coffee Morning is in Brimpsfield Village Hall on Saturday 29th April; there will be a bring-and-buy plant stall in aid of the Society's funds, and we hope that there will also be plants from local grower Lottie Prentice in the car park for sale as well. Refreshments (and plant stall browsing) will be available from 10.30am, with plant stall selling starting at 11am. If you can't be at the AGM and would like to join the Society, membership cards will be available at the Plant Sale on payment of the annual subscription, which is only £3 per person or £5 for a couple.

Easter weekend is traditionally a popular time for shopping for new plants for the garden. You might like to try our Plant Sale instead – there are usually some very interesting plants available – but, if you can't wait, consider supporting a local nursery rather than a big garden centre. They can usually provide information about your chosen plant and advice on how to care for it, and their labelling is generally more helpful (garden centre plants sometimes come with a generic label, perhaps with a photo that doesn't actually reflect the specific plant); their plants are often also homegrown and so better suited to the local climate. Look, too, for plants grown in environmentally friendly peat-free compost and, if buying compost, check that it is peat-free (if the bag doesn't say, it will contain peat). And think about choosing plants that offer benefits to wildlife, such as those with the RHS's 'Plants for Pollinators' logo, or those with berries for the birds.

Cranham Common News

This is the CCMC report to the CCT AGM on 18th March:

This has been the second year of the current grazing management regime, with the cows grazing only from late August through to January. This was also our second year using the NoFence GPS collars, which have been a huge success. There were signs last summer the new regime having a beneficial effect on the flora and fauna, with an enormous number of orchids seen. These included the common pyramid orchid but also some more unusual ones such as butterfly orchids and bee orchids that have historically been seen on the common but not in the last few years. There were also sightings of glow worms in multiple areas of the common, something that we have not seen for years. This was attributed to the longer grass which is their preferred habitat. There were also a few lizards spotted. Butterflies still seemed low in numbers, but that may have been weather related.

The adder telemetry project has continued from Autumn 2022 into spring 2023, with Nigel Hand monitoring our adder population, but we will not have an update on his findings until later in the year.

The common is in excellent condition at the moment. At this stage of the winter the aim is for a variety of different habitats, including short grass, medium length, tussocky patches and some rank grass areas. All these provide a choice of habitat for the various different species that live here. This is exactly what we have now, as we wait for spring and for the common to burst into life.

Bramble patches, areas of blackthorn and other scrub are wildlife havens providing shelter and food for many of our insects, birds and small mammals and are areas to be valued and protected. At the same time these areas need to be controlled so they do not spread too far into the grassland for which the common is known. This is a constantly monitored balance that underpins the work carried out during winter work parties.

Over the winter 2022-2023 we ran 4 workparties and are very grateful to all those who attended. The cubs joined in the last workparty, along with some parents and leaders, and we were very grateful for their energy and enthusiasm carrying bags of cut vegetation down the hill and returning empty sacks. It is always nice to see some new faces to join our regular volunteers, and everyone is welcome. We can find jobs for all ages and levels of fitness. Scrub clearance can only be carried out between November and February, so is finished for this winter.

Cranham common is part of a network of conservations sites throughout Gloucestershire, representatives from NE and NT will be giving a presentation at this meeting (CCT AGM) about how they and other conservation groups are collaborating to try to link these different sites and create wildlife corridors throughout Gloucestershire.

With the challenges of climate change and loss of habitat for so many of our native species, and the decline in numbers of most native flora and fauna, vertebrates and invertebrates, it is more important than ever that everyone does what they can to help. This can be by caring for our woodlands and commons, but there is also much we can all do in our own gardens. Look out for our monthly Common News in the magazine for ideas as to how we can all collectively do our bit to support nature.

Supporting wildlife in your garden

Collectively our gardens cover a huge area, and with a bit of thought each of us can contribute to supporting wildlife and help create habitat corridors in the area.

1. Dandelions

Dandelions are one of our earliest garden flowers, and an important nectar source for bees. Rather than seeing them as an annoying weed, consider them as an important natural food larder for insects and leave some to flower in your garden.

2. Reduce your mowing

Our lawns will soon be growing, often full of daisies and clover, these are also good nectar sources for insects. Can we view these pretty flowers as friends not enemies? A plain short cropped lawn with just grass is a monoculture with little value to wildlife but left to flower it can become a valued part of the ecosystem. Could you mow paths through your lawn to add interest rather than 'lawn stripes'?

3. Planting wildflowers will support insects butterflies and bees. This could be in pots if you don't have a suitable area in your garden. Remember that wildflowers usually need poor soil to thrive.



4. Don't dig! Digging disturbs the creatures and fungi that live in our soils, and these are incredibly important for the soil ecosystem. Plant directly into undug soil, and mulch to suppress weeds. Mulching holds moisture in the soil, suppresses weeds, and encourages worms to compost on site. Mulch can be anything from shredded organic material, grass cuttings, leaves, straw or similar organic matter.

Cranham Cubs

It struck me, as I sat down to lunch last Sunday, no not a projectile potato launched by my own children, but metaphorically, that Cranham Cubs very rarely appear in the Parish Magazine. This momentary and rare flash of thought arose following a fun filled weekend at our first cub sleep over since lock down. As a result, I wondered if it may be of interest to some if I passed commentary on our Wednesday evening antics at the Scout HO.

The first question usually asked is why do we do it? a very good question I would reply, but the answer is quite straightforward. For all of us leaders it is simply because attending cubs in our own youth gave us some great life skills which we have continued to enjoy throughout our lives and we seek to pass that limited knowledge onto the next generation. I say enjoy because I don't think any of us have genuinely found ourselves lost on a desert island with nothing but a bit of string and a knecker to keep us alive – although we may have willingly put ourselves in that position to test our own mettle – at least Josh probably has!!

Essentially, we hope to offer to all the cubs that come through the Cranham pack an opportunity to learn practical skills to take through into their adult life (or more likely forget by the end of the week) but most importantly to have fun whilst doing it. This of course is delivered by a badge lead programme of activities and challenges. The plan is to give every cub the opportunity to achieve the necessary badges that are required to earn the Chief Scouts' Silver Award – the top cub badge.

Over the last couple of months, we have had an exciting programme of activities that has seen our 22 cubs achieve 110 badges between them as well as contribute towards many others. These activities have included Bell Ringing with Tower Captain Rob Garrett, a trip to the Javelin Park incinerator and a visit to Dursley firestation courtesy of one of our very own leaders, firefighter Ben Chamberlain. We have tried haggis, tatties and neaps on Burns Night and spent an evening with Janet Whitton learning about life in the village 100 years ago and Gladys Hilliers association with Ordnance Survey Maps. This has all been capped off by a 2-night sleep over at the HQ where we were able to give the cubs an opportunity to be away from home, complete some challenging badge work and get stuck in to some scrub bashing on the common.



Councillor resignation

Electricity work

The works will start in mid-May and finish in September.

BUS SERVICES MEETING - Saturday 11th March 2023

Following the changes in bus routes which have affected many residents in the Painswick and Cranham area Gill Hopkins is currently campaigning to have the early morning bus route re-instated and better public transport for the village.

A meeting was held to listen to concerns raised through your personal narratives, discuss possible solutions and how I as your County Councillor can take this forward.

The meeting was very well supported with 21 residents and parish council representatives plus apologies from 4 villagers who were unable to attend. Showing the commitment to get our bus back and for a better service in the village.

A brief history of the situation was given, and examples of buses being cancelled through lack of drivers. The rationale from Stagecoach of why the route was taken off was that it was not viable as so few people used it. Since COVID the numbers of passengers on the buses have depleted, however we all agreed that people would use the service if it was reliable. There is also the issue of no parking at Cranham corner to safely leave a car to use the buses.

There were also examples where our younger residents have been unable to meet friends outside the village or go into the towns because of the poor service and times of the buses.

Public transport needs to improve to enable us to be more environmentally friendly, reducing our carbon footprint, and this won't happen without viable alternatives. We all discussed various options of how we can have a service coming into the village. We also discussed options about parking.

I have since informed Cllr Robinson, the cabinet member for transport of your ideas and how we could possibly resolve at least some of the issues. I have also agreed to take your ideas to the directorate for transport to seek their support in negotiating to get our buses back. Gill, Liza, Sue and I will be looking into the parking issue.

The meeting was so positive and so many great ideas put forward that can be now looked at in greater detail and assessed for feasibility.

Thank you to all who attended, we will update in due course.
