She will be doing a placement until the end of June. During this time, she will be in charge of the benefice. Please give her a warm welcome.

We are now into the season of Lent, this time of penitence and preparation for Easter. Traditionally Christians celebrate in some special way. Some follow a particular course of study either individually or in a group. For instance, The Bible Reading Fellowship have issued a Lent Book entitled "Images of Grace". This contains daily Bible readings and summary questions at the end of each week. Some make a point of extra giving to a particular charity such as a food bank or a vital need at the moment like the Turkey/Syria earthquake appeal. Another idea is helping out with a particular person in need with some job or jobs which they are unable to tackle.

Extracts from The Messenger – March 2023

OneDiocese blog: "All children should have access to Jesus."



Ahead of the 'Under five and flourishing' conference on 18th March, Sarah Major, Education Administrator for Jumping Fish Ltd at the Diocese of Gloucester, shares her calling to work with schools and churches to support children in their spiritual growth and development. "Looking at Matthew 19:14, lesus says, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not

hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these.' He said let the little children come to me, determining all children. He didn't invite only those that excelled in their Early Years Foundation Stage neurological markers, he said all.

"My career started in the education field. I chose to dedicate my time working with families and their young people to assist them with accessing an education – that was often tailor-made for them and their needs. It was through this work that the family as a 'whole unit' was highlighted, alongside how this 'unit' was unable to 'unite' themselves with pre-determined sociological and environmental markers.

"I felt a passion burning inside me to learn more about our young people who experience neurological uniqueness and I developed in this area at postgraduate level. With this wider learning, I felt empowered to apply myself within this field, ensuring that all children under my care could access education in a safe and appropriate manner.

"I was able to transfer these skills, powered by the desire to encourage all children to have access to Jesus and the remarkable work that we hear about in the Bible.

"I feel churches often struggle with knowing where to start with welcoming a family which includes diversity. Our brains are as unique as our fingertips and the task of incorporating this uniqueness into our churches is vast."

Under five and flourishing is a day conference aimed at anyone who has contact with under fives, or any churches that want to learn more about ministry among this age group. The day offers bite-sized theory and a handful of ideas to take away to use within your setting.

The last workparty of the year was attended by Cranham Cubs, it was lovely to see the next generation participating in caring for our common, and learning about why conservation is so important.

I would like to thank everyone who helped out on our workparties over the winter, by working together we really make a difference. Scrub clearance this winter has been mainly removing small scrub oaks and blackthorn regrowth, and the brushcutter team have done a fantastic job of tidying up bramble areas.

The cows have finished their winter grazing and as the days lengthen the common is ready to 'wake up' with the spring growth.

Why do we have gorse bushes on the common?

Have you ever wondered why we have a patch of gorse on the common? Gorse is not native to limestone grassland commons, but historically most commons have a patch of gorse nurtured by local residents.



Dried gorse was a valuable resource used

as firelighters by the local community. Gorse flowers were also used to make wine and tea.

Supporting Wildlife In Your Garden

Collectively our gardens cover a huge area, and with a bit of thought each of us can contribute to supporting wildlife and help create habitat corridors in the area.

- **Planting insect and bee friendly flowers.** Many garden centres and seed packets indicate bee friendly plants that provide a nectar source for bees and butterflies. Even if you can only plant them in a pot insects will find and appreciate them.
- **Don't use slug pellets or pesticides** in the garden. One brood of blue tits can eat as many as 1,000 caterpillars per day. This is just one example; by supporting as much wildlife as possible in your garden, you will encourage a variety of natural predators to help control pests. You will also be able to enjoy a garden buzzing with life rather than one that may be pretty but sterile.
- **Give your lawnmower a break**. If you can bring yourself to mow your lawn a bit less you will soon see the benefits as daisies, dandelions, clovers, cowslips and trefoils begin to appear, bringing colour to the garden and, more importantly, providing nectar for visiting insects. **Dandelions**, in particular, are a vitally important source of pollen for early bees when there is very little else in flower in the countryside.
- **Build a compost heap.** Compost heaps are a great way to recycle garden and food waste whilst providing lovely rich eco-friendly compost for the garden. They are also favoured by reptiles such as slow worms and grass snakes. Compost heaps are especially important for grass snakes, as they need warm places to lay their eggs, and where could be better than a nice cosy compost heap? If you do create a compost heap, ideally don't turn it during the spring and summer to avoid disturbing any visiting reptiles or their eggs.



- Create a pile in a corner of the garden of any old logs, bricks, stones, etc. that you find. This will provide invaluable habitat for amphibians and reptiles as well as small mammals, slugs and snails, which in turn provide food for hedgehogs and birds. Many rare insects such as Lesser Stag Beetles live in rotting wood and are larvae for many years before emerging as adults, so longstanding neglected log piles are very important for these species. Building a dead hedge is also a great way of disposing of woody prunings (much better than a bonfire!), recycling nutrients and benefiting wildlife as well as your garden; see https://www.rspb.org.uk/get-involved/ activities/nature-on-your- doorstep/garden-activities/build-adead-hedge-for-wildlife/
- **Dig a pond**. This is one of the best things that you can do to attract wildlife into your garden. Most ponds will swiftly attract amphibians, dragonflies and all manner of other creatures as well as providing a water source and bathing area for wild birds and mammals. There is lots of information online about how to create a wildlife friendly pond but the main things to bear in mind are not to stock the pond with fish, which will eat much of the pondlife, and to include shallow areas as well as deep areas to allow animals to get in and out of the pond easily. If you don't have space to dig a pond, even a small pond in a container such as an old sink will still provide benefits for wildlife; just make sure there is a way for animals to climb in and out of it.

March is, for many gardeners, the start of the gardening year – the month which is often mild enough for seed



sowing and for the gardener to turn his or her attention to their outdoor space. It's usually not warm enough for half-hardy plants to be entrusted outside, though, so bear this in mind if you're buying plug plants from the garden centre; if you don't have anywhere to keep them safe from frosts until May, it's better to hold off. Meanwhile, you can get some inspiration for your patio containers at our March coffee morning, on 4th March, when our speaker, Harriet Ryecroft, will be talking about container gardening; Harriet used to be Head Gardener at Whichford Pottery, where she created many stunning potted plant displays. Even if you aspire to something more modest, come along to pick up some colourful ideas! As usual, coffee and home-made cake will be available from 10.30am, with the talk starting at 11.00am.

Growing at least some of your own food has never been so popular, with rising prices, the importance of sustainability and the evidence for the health benefits of gardening all much in the news. You can start to sow some vegetables in March, but it's best to keep an eye on the weather forecast and wait until later in the month if it's still chilly, especially if you garden in a frost pocket or in an exposed location (as many of us do). Tomatoes and other half-hardy vegetables are best left until April or even May; earlier sowings tend to hang around waiting for the warmer weather to be potted on and planted out, and later seedlings will soon catch up!

Notes from the Chair – follow up

After my notes last month, I am pleased to report that the grit bins were filled very quickly by County Council Highways.

Also, the Parish Council bid under the Speedwatch initiative has been approved. Initially one camera will be installed near the Village Hall during the next few weeks, as well as appropriate signage.

'My Life as Mayor of Gloucester'

A talk given by Chris Witts to the Cranham Local History Society

on 26th January

The AGM over, we had a delightfully honest talk from Chris Witts, a former mayor and sheriff of Gloucester. Having worked on the river and as a firefighter he so enjoyed delivering leaflets that his local party suggested he might like to become a councillor. At the third time of asking he gave in. He came to politics later in life, with no particular allegiance other than, as he put it, to common sense. He quickly found himself on committees, and a senior representative of his party. He was in at the deep end. In a few years he was sheriff and then in 2009 the mayor. He could be a rebel. He went on walkabouts against official advice. He had a run in with council officials over his choice of a chaplain, who it seems had fallen out with everyone, including his bishop. Prayers before council meetings were supposed to be brief but the chaplain never got the message.

Chris was a remarkably apolitical politician, less concerned about political issues but adept at the day to day. Endless functions, with the mayoral car on hand. He was proud of his Victorian chain of office (made of horseshoes) but it weighed him down, as did his mayoral attire. On one occasion three meetings turned out to be three lunches, at all of which he had to eat. He was badly advised and turned up in a sweater to an opera in Gloucester's twin city of Trier in Germany, when everyone else was in formal attire. A highpoint was the Queen and the Duke's visit to Gloucester when he and Queen were seated side by side, and they chatted for a full hour. She talked about the Windsor Castle fire and her new apartment –and how difficult the potatoes were to cut. She was concerned that if she pressed too hard they might fly across table.

Was this quite 'history' we might have asked ourselves. Well, yes, it was recent history, and delightfully informal, which is all too rare. He avoided name dropping by conveniently forgetting the names of most of the people he'd met. It was the stories that carried the evening, and that sense that he was always the outsider, stopping other folk from being too serious. Chris was an ordinary man, who was for a year, as mayors are, the number one citizen of his city, and it made for an enjoyable evening.

STROUD NEEDS BUSES CAMPAIGN -

STOP STAGECOACH

Many people may not know that Stagecoach are rerouting bus 66 away from Cranham to Brockworth and Cheltenham up Gloucester St in Painswick to Abbeydale and Gloucester Business Park and then on to Cheltenham WEF 19th Feb. Instead of an hourly bus from Stroud via Cranham to Cheltenham we will have a new bus 166. This will come from Eastcombe Thomas Keble School via Cranham to Brockworth. Only 3 buses a day Monday to Friday and 2 x buses on Saturday's. We are a bit luckier on Sundays and BH as bus 166 will travel via Cranham to Cheltenham 5 times per day. This is because the Sunday and BH bus is subsidized by Gloucester County Council (see Stagecoach web site for new timetable). The loss of our bus is going to affect people who rely on buses such as local school children, & pensioners as well as people visiting Cheltenham Hospital, general shopping, pharmacy/GP surgery in Painswick, catching trains from Stroud and Cheltenham and just getting out and about.

Stagecoach have explained that bus 66 does not have enough passengers between Painswick and Brockworth and the route is uneconomical to run. During Covid the Government subsided the buses and this subsidy is finishing end of March 2023.

There is a lot of work being done by people who are being effected by the loss of their buses such as the 63,64,66,67. A group of us attended Gloucestershire County Council meeting on Wednesday 15th Feb at Shire Hall where attendees who had submitted questions regarding the loss of our local bus services were able to ask supplementary questions to Councilor Philip Robinson (Cabinet Member for Education, Skills, and Bus Transport). Cllr Robinson stated that he had sympathy for the loss of buses but that there was no extra money to help rural services.

What can we do?

We are hoping to set up a village meeting soon to discuss what type of bus service local villagers might like. It is being supported by Councilor Sue Williams who is a great support to us. If anyone has any questions please either get in touch with me or Councilor Sue Williams.

Gosh, March already! Time flies when you are busy and it's certainly been a busy two months at the Village Hall. A good spring clean has been



completed, the annual fire safety inspection has gone ahead and the installation of Wi-Fi courtesy of Gigaclear and their COMMUNITY HUB scheme. An application was made last October and we were approved for being granted a free installation and a year's free connection until February 2024!



A Bumblebee Day Out - Saturday 20th May Cranham Village Hall

By now you may have spotted a few hardy bumblebees out and about searching for nectar from the flowers that are beginning to bloom. The queen bees have been hibernating all over winter so are on the hunt for food and they are VERY hungry.

Last year we had to cancel the bumblebee ID day as Richard Comont Scientist for Bumble Bee Conservation Trust was unwell so we are once again we are holding another bumblebee day on Saturday 20th May the Cranham Commons Committee are hosting a bumblebee identification day with Dr Richard Comont who is the Science Manager for The Bumblebee Conservation Trust (BBCT). Richard has visited Cranham on a few occasions giving very interesting talks about our special little pollinators, previously the talks have been open to anyone from within the village and those who live outside of the village, however this time we are hoping to fill the hall with enthusiastic villagers. If, however we do not have enough interest from the village we will open it up to other people.

This year we are aiming to excite and enthuse as many people as possible by getting you all interested in bumblebees. Working with Natural England we are going to examine the biodiversity of the Common and the numbers and number of species of bumblebees vs the flora. This can be achieved by setting up a Bee Walk. A BeeWalk is a standardised bumblebee-monitoring scheme which involves volunteer 'BeeWalkers' walking the same fixed route (transect) once a month between March and October, counting the bumblebees seen and identifying them to species and caste (queen, worker, male) where possible.

Established in 2008, and opened to the public in 2010, the twin aims of the scheme are collecting abundance and distribution data on the UK's bumblebees and using this data as widely as possible to analyse population trends and carry out other research as appropriate.

The information collected by BeeWalk volunteers is integral to monitoring how bumblebee populations change through time and will allow us to detect early warning signs of population declines. All data collected will contribute to important long-term monitoring of bumblebee population changes in response to changes in land-use and climate change and, ultimately, to informing how we manage the countryside. To find out more please visit the BBCT site where there is a wealth of information available.

The BBCT introduced a 'Bee The Change' a few years ago and it would be great if we can be a 'Bee The Village' setting up bee flower corridors and committing to a 'no mow lawn' for three or four weeks in the summer. Just imagine hiding your mower, enjoying the peace and quiet, and seeing what emerges, bumblebees love flowering weeds. In collaborating with Natural England and Cranham Common Trust. 
