Coronation of King Charles III

The Coronation ceremony for His Majesty King Charles III and Her Majesty The Queen Consort will take place on 6th May at Westminster Abbey. As well as the ceremony itself, other events are being planned around the weekend of the Coronation, including the 'Coronation Big Lunch' on 7th May, with a concert taking place at Windsor in the evening, and the nationwide 'The Big Help Out' community activity day on Monday 8th May.

The theme of the Coronation celebrations is to highlight the positive impact of community volunteering. We are so proud of our voluntary network in and around the Diocese of Gloucester. From serving our churches as churchwardens, treasurers, Messy Church teams, or foundation governors to serving our communities as Cats Protection volunteers, hospital drivers, or leading Girlguides or Scouts, Church of England volunteers across the country devote over 23 million hours to community action over and above their normal church activities.

As part of the Big Help Out day, everybody is warmly invited to attend a special service at Gloucester Cathedral on Monday 8th May at I Iam. The service will be led by the Rt Revd Bishop Rachel Treweek and the new Dean of Gloucester, the Very Revd Canon Andrew Zihni.

Ebworth

In the windows of sun amongst the serious amounts of rain we have had over the last month we have had some nice springy wildlife sightings at Ebworth. First chiffchaffs and blackcaps have been heard singing and the first wheatear of the year has been seen on the drive to The Ebworth Centre. Also, a real herald of spring in the form of the first swallows over the farmland.

Whilst on an early morning walk in the woods I found a marsh tit nest high up in an oak tree. These little birds are declining rapidly nationally so it's nice to a see them nesting here. The ponds in Workmans Wood have a pair of moorhens making a nest and the mandarin ducks are back this year. These super showy ducks are native to the far east of China and Russa and the northern islands of Japan. The birds breeding in the UK are escapees from wildfowl collections. It may seem unusual for a duck, but they spend a lot of time perched high up in trees and they nest in tree cavities and old woodpecker holes.

The stinking and green hellebores are in full flower as I write. Like many early spring flowering plants, the flowers face downward to help prevent the precious pollen and nectar being washed/blow away in the rough wintery weather. The stinking hellebore can be found on dry slopes to the west of Workmans Wood. The green hellebore in more moist areas to the east.

If you are walking in the woods keep an eye out for the colourful scarlet elf cup fungi. Unusually for fungi they fruit in late winter and early spring. They grow on fallen dead wood preferring sycamore or beech and show how important it is for biodiversity to leave have lots of dead wood habitat in a woodland.



As May progresses look out for migrant birds arriving or passing through and wildflowers coming out. Especially the bluebells and ramsons in the woods.

This week we have planted the final tree in the new orchard opposite the



Ebworth Centre car park. In total 60 fruit trees have been planted. Apples, pears, plums, cherries and a couple of walnuts. Mostly traditional Gloucestershire varieties. A massive thank you to Sheepscombe School who helped to plant 35 of the trees!"

The Garden Society has no events in May, but don't forget our Plant Sale and Coffee Morning in Brimpsfield Village Hall on Saturday 29th April, with selling starting at 11.00am in aid of the Society's funds, and also the chance to view what plants local grower Lottie Prentice has for sale. Make a note, too, of our Open Gardens and Afternoon Tea in Birdlip on Saturday 3rd June; more details in next month's magazine!

As we all know, costs are rising considerably and the Garden Society's costs, particularly speakers' charges and hall hire, are no exception. At the recent Annual General Meeting the members present voted to raise the annual subscription to £8 per person (£12 for a couple), to allow us to maintain our programme for the coming year. Membership entitles you to take part in our summer self-drive outing and our annual Show in September, as well as to come to our series of winter coffee morning talks. As usual, these will bring speakers covering a wide range of subjects, focussed not just on gardening but on topics relevant to most people: sustainability, and particularly our local area, its traditions and wildlife. Talks this coming year will include insects in the garden, folklore, a local initiative to collect and distribute plant seeds, and medicinal herbs. These are always sociable occasions; why not come along and join us?

Gardening for wildlife is no longer seen as being just for cranks, and No Mow May, leaving lawns wholly or partly uncut to allow wildflowers to bloom for pollinating insects, is becoming a regular gardening practice. Last year we left part of our lawn unmown for several months and were rewarded not only with a large patch of cowslips but also with over 60 pyramidal orchids which had colonised an area of the grass, having appeared from nowhere. Try leaving some of your lawn uncut and see what happens!

Cranham Common News

Those who attended the CCT AGM on 18th March enjoyed a fascinating presentation from Aidan Fallon and Jesper Knapton from Natural England, and Tom Griffin from National Trust, on their collaborative efforts to create linked habitat corridors throughout Gloucestershire. It is very encouraging to see how these organisations are working together.

Part of this big picture planning is to create a new habitat corridor at the top of the common above the Trout Farm to link up with Overtown Farm. Under dense tree canopy there are minimal ground cover plants, so opening up the light allows ground plants to regrow and encourages wildlife to move along the corridors. The cleared area is parallel to the well used footpath from the Commemorative Plaque towards Overtown but is screened from the footpath by brambles and dead hedges. This is to minimise disturbance to wildlife from walkers and dogs. At the moment it looks very bare with the trees having been removed, but it won't be long before we see regrowth of more ground cover.

We are looking forward to welcoming the skylarks back to the common. Skylarks are ground nesting birds so they will appreciate the slightly longer grassy areas that provide them with cover. They are, however, vulnerable to disturbance from dogs, so we will be putting up notices to remind dog owners to keep dogs under control in the areas where they nest (which is below the old cricket pitch and near the gorse area).

We know from surveys on the adder population that adders benefit from fencing off a key adder area to reduce disturbance by walkers and dogs, and they are spreading more widely over the common as a result. This has been repeated this year and we have already put-up fencing to reduce footfall, which will be there for the summer. Adders like to sunbathe on warm days, they are cold blooded and can only move around freely once they have warmed up, so you may see them more on sunny days.

How you can help our adders:

If you see an adder, don't panic! The adder will be much more scared of you than you are of it, and probably move out of your way quickly. Just step carefully away and you will be fine.

Adders can be disturbed by dogs if they dive into bramble areas (for example chasing a rabbit), and in this situation the adder could bite the dog. To keep both adders and dogs safe, please do not let your dog disturb bramble areas.

Please let me know if you see an adder. If possible please take a photo of the head, as this can be useful for identification. Send the photo to me Liz Hayden 07974 386341 or via email to chair.ccmc@gmail.com.

Be careful if you are **picking blackberries** later in the season, if you step into a bramble patch you may be stepping into adder territory!

Dog Poo

Dogs are normally fed a high protein diet, and if left on the ground a single dog poo can add nutrition to an area up to 1 square metre. The wildflowers that thrive on our common do so because it is low in nutrients, so we really appreciate owners picking up after their dogs. Dog poo bins are provided near the school and by the cricket club track.
