A Letter from The Clergy



Clergy Article - PETER THE ROCK

At the end of June, we celebrate the feast day of St. Peter the Apostle. Petertide is the main time of the year when ordinations to the Diaconate and the Priesthood take place in our great cathedrals and parish churches. People often say they wonder where the time goes as the years fly by. I can hardly believe that come 25th June 2023 I shall celebrate the 45th (Sapphire Jubilee) of my ordination as a priest in Lincoln cathedral. The ordaining bishop was Simon Phipps, a lovely, gentle, compassionate man, who was himself consecrated as bishop by the saintly Michael Ramsey who, in my view was the greatest Archbishop of Canterbury of the 20th century. In one of the transepts of Lincoln cathedral you will find a wonderful bronze statue of another Anglican saint - Bishop Edward King who was a much - loved pastoral Bishop of Lincoln from 1885 to 1910. I love to read his Spiritual Letters to members of the clergy of Lincolnshire. Three great examples of exemplary episcopal ministry — Phipps, Ramsey, and King. The present Bench would do well to follow their Godly examples.

I remember as an ordinand in the early 1970s at Lincoln Theological College a very wise Hospital Chaplain described the ministry as "Wasting Time for God's Sake!". I'm not sure if I have wasted the last 45 years but I can think of no finer calling than a call to serve God in Holy Orders.

Please pray for more vocations to the sacred ministry in order to continue the ministry of Our Blessed Lord once committed to St. Peter with the words "Thou art Peter, the Rock and upon this Rock I will build my church and the gates of Hell will never prevail against it.

The Trussel Trust has issued its End of Year statistics which make for sobering reading. Food banks in the Trussell Trust network distributed close to 3 million (2,986,203) emergency food parcels (nationally) between 1st April 2022 to 31st March 2023. This is the most parcels that the network has ever distributed in a financial year and represents a 37% increase from the same period in 2021/22.

Birds and bugs benefit from diocesan wildlife grant in Dursley

A diocesan environment grant, dedicated to helping local parish churches deliver new environmental initiatives, has enabled St James the Great, Dursley, to establish multiple projects in its urban gardens and grounds.



St James the Great stands in the heart of Dursley town centre and has seen extensive renovation and restoration work. Five years ago, members from the worshipping community formed an Eco Church group with a shared interest in promoting care for the church and local environment.

Gillian Mather, a member of the group, says, "Our initial focus was to achieve the Eco Church Bronze Award. We attended a training event run by the diocesan Environmental Engagement Officer and by working through the issues raised in the scheme's questionnaire, we were able to direct many of our plans, including promoting the wildlife in our urban churchyard."

In recent years, the group has introduced several projects including the introduction of 'No Mow May', liaison with the local 'Men's Shed' group to help with the manufacture of eight bird nesting boxes, and the construction of a substantial bug hotel.

"The bug hotel is not only encouraging the insect and minibeast population in the churchyard, but it is also a visible point of interest for the worshipping community who use the public footpath close by. It provides a focal point for several of our Churches Count on Nature events, including Guides, Brownies and local primary school events. Most recently, the young people were shown how it is possible to construct their own small insect hotel at home using a tin or flowerpot."

Children's book explains issues around bats in churches

Bats in Churches has published its first ever children's book to explain the benefits and challenges of bats roosting in churches.

The story, written by Bats in Churches engagement officers Rose Riddell and Diana Spencer and illustrated by Chris Shields, was inspired by the real-life case of All Saints, a Grade II listed I2th century church in Braunston-in-Rutland. where the impact of bat droppings and

urine was causing such an impact that they considered closing it.

Rose and Diana were inspired to create a children's book to help communicate the issues around bats in churches to a younger audience and their families, as well as raise awareness of the impact of habitat loss caused by human activities on bats.

Blue plaque reveals more about Christian leader A blue plaque commemorating the life of influential evangelist George Whitefield has been updated to give a more rounded account of his life story.

Following a review of the city's monuments and statues carried out by Gloucester City Council and a commitment to providing a more balanced



view of the city's links to the transatlantic slave trade, more information has been added to various plaques.

The plaque at St Mary de Crypt now includes Whitefield's support for slavery, which he campaigned to be relegalised in the American state of Georgia, and mentions that he owned a plantation which helped fund an orphanage he'd set up to teach young boys.

The Revd Canon Nikki Arthy, Rector of St Mary de Crypt Church, said: "Systemic failures of the past and present can only be addressed when we learn more about our history. Discover DeCrypt continues to reaffirm a commitment to racial justice seeking to respect, honour and care for all people."

The 'Tradition and Legacy: A Spotlight on George Whitefield' exhibition runs until Sunday, 8 October at the Museum of Gloucester.

The Cotswold Navy:

Exploring our region's inseparable links with the sea

A talk given to the Cranham Local History Society by
Paul Barnett on 4th May

We had been looking forward to a return visit from Paul (he's previously talked about the Purton hulks down by Sharpness) and we were not disappointed. A Tynesider by birth, 'it's empty' was his response when he first cast eyes on the Severn. Paul has done much over the years to bring the river back to life.

The title of his talk refers to the 'Cotswold navy'. There were two 'navies' as Paul described them, the civilian and the military. On the civilian side there were the boat builders, and specifically the builders of lighters, the barges that plied the Sharpness to Gloucester canal and beyond. Two shipbuilders stood out, GT Beard and Chadburn. Beard was responsible for the Stroudwater barge which solved the problem of turning a barge on a narrow canal without 'winding holes' (places to turn), by simply removing the rudder from one end and attaching it to the other. Chadburn had a fleet named for local villages including Cuffley, Birdlip – and Cranham. Cranham survives it seems as one of the many hulks propping up the canal wall near Sharpness.

The Cotswolds military navy, by contrast, took to the high seas on ships which local towns had no part in building, but which they sponsored. Gloucester did have a role building the concrete barges and developing blueprints for the concrete platforms ('beetles') which were part of Mulberry harbours in the 1944 Normandy landings. But Paul's main focus was on the remarkable Warship Weeks, part of the wider National Savings campaign, when for one week in 1942 towns and cities, and communities up and down the country, raised money ('by whist drives or selling gin or whatever it was...', in Paul's words) to help re-equip a navy which no longer needed dreadnoughts but did need minesweepers and submarines for the very different kind of warfare, not least convoy protection, the country was faced with. The Warship Weeks campaign was spread over twenty-four weeks and raised an extraordinary £956 million. There was a shopping list to choose from, with a destroyer coming in at £700,000. £210,000 would buy the hull, £250,000 the engine room and auxiliary items, £240,000 the guns and ammunition. It was all spelt out, from a bolt, or lifebelt, or a sick bed, to a torpedo, at £2,000 each.

Paul quoted Dursley as a specific example: £253,000 went toward a T Class submarine, HMS Trident, which had been laid 1938 – it already existed, but no matter, the town could adopt it as its own. In its time it torpedoed at least one ship, 'winged' the 'Prinz Eugen', and trailed the 'Turpitz'. In 1946 it was sold for scrap: its pennant and bell are in the local parish church. Ships sponsored by other places had less glamorous lives. Cheltenham's HMS Legion was sunk in Valletta harbour. Chipping Sodbury's Tutankhamen was torpedoed even before the name was officially assigned and Evesham's Jupiter was also torpedoed.

There was it seems a degree of inter-urban rivalry. Gloucester fell short of its target (though it raised £42 million over the seven days), Cheltenham on the other hand had a £130,000 excess: asked whether it would agree to transfer the excess to Gloucester it refused. At a more practical level Cheltenham had responded well to appeals to hand over steel or cast-iron railings, and milk pans, but neither were used: the cast-iron went for scrap, being the wrong grade. But the public weren't to know this. They were doing their bit.



A fascinating discussion about HMS Cranham, a minesweeper [M2701] launched in 1953, brought the meeting to a close. The bell from the ship was presented to the village in 1967 and it is sounded each year to end the Remembrance Day minute's silence. (Information from Jan Whitton.)

Brimpsfield & Mid-Cotswold Garden Society

As we move from a rather chilly and wet spring into what we hope will be a pleasant summer, your garden's spring bulb display will be drawing to a close. You may still have alliums, and perhaps late tulips, in bloom, but the main display will be past, to be replaced by summer flowers. You probably won't be thinking about next spring's display just yet, but this is the time to give some thought to how to have an even better show next year. After all. these are the plants that give us so much pleasure in the dark days of late winter when a host of golden daffodils, or crocus or early tulips, is just the thing to lift your spirits, and they are worth a few minutes of planning. Have you seen varieties in someone else's garden that you would like to try? Or do you have a corner of the garden – or maybe a new pot – that would benefit from some extra spring colour? The bulb suppliers' catalogues will be available soon with a wide range of varieties – but be warned, they can be addictive! If you're not wanting new bulbs but your existing ones are a bit congested, there is still time to lift them, split the clumps and replant them at a better spacing so that they flower more successfully next year or give some to a friend or neighbour!

The Garden Society's main summer event is the Open Gardens in Birdlip on Saturday 3rd June; come to Birdlip Village Hall (behind the school) from 2pm for a map of the six gardens that will be open. The cost is £5 per person or £8 for a couple, to include tea and home-made cake which will be available in the hall from 2.00pm until 4.00pm. This will be an excellent opportunity to see a variety of gardens with ideas for you to try in your own plot, so come along and enjoy!

Ebworth

It has been wonderful enjoying the spring arriving up at Ebworth. There are lots of skylarks up on Overtown Farm it's a joy hearing them sing, there are lots of yellowhammers about too. In the woods two summer migrants, chiffchaffs and blackcaps can be heard singing away. The bluebells and ramsons have been looking amazing in the woods. A great place to see them is along the bridleway down from Foston's Ash. Keep an eye out for yellow archangel growing in sunny spots near the sides of paths in the woodlands. It is a relative of the nettle with lovely whorls of yellow flowers. It really stands out at this time of year. This year seems to have been a good year for cowslips. They have been seen in spots not seen before.



I am on a high as I write this because I have just found 3 green-winged orchids on Overtown whilst doing a butterfly survey. These could well be new records for the site and certainly for the fields they were found in. Two of them are particularly exciting because they are in a field which our amazing tenants reverted from arable to permanent pasture 7 years ago. It's amazing to see these rare orchids colonising so quickly (orchids grow slowly)!

I gave a bird walk around Ebworth for the Stroud Valleys Project in April. This was really well attended with 15 people coming along. We had a nice mornings walk highlights being; wheatears and yellowhammers along the drive, marsh tits and blackcaps in the woods and a male redstart.

Looking forward June is probably the best time of year for wildlife at Ebworth. There will be orchids galore in the form of white helleborine and birds-nest orchids in the woods and pyramidal and common spotted can be seen from the public footpaths on Overtown Farm. It's good for butterflies too. Look for big, bright orange, silver-washed fritillaries in the woods.

The walk started at 5:00pm so most of the walk is in the dark.

Cranham Parish Council met on May 2nd.

As this was our annual meeting there were a number of administrative matters to be agreed, such as our annual financial return and review of insurance, banking arrangements, and appointment of auditor

Vacancy - There is still a vacancy on the Council. I would encourage anybody who wishes to get involved in the community to get in touch, no experience necessary, and it's only 6 meetings a year!

Speeding - The Speedwatch camera has been received and will be installed once the warning signs have been received.

Planning - The Council is a statutory consultee for all planning applications within the parish. We do not make the decision to grant or refuse, that's the District Council. Because we only meet every two months our clerk has delegated authority to assess councillors views and respond accordingly to the LPA (local planning authority- Stroud District Council). We have recently agreed a policy to reflect our concerns regarding light pollution and its detrimental environmental effect. on light pollution. In future a statement reflecting this policy will be made against all planning applications.

Grants - Council agreed a grant to assist in the upkeep of the churchyard.

Village e-mail - Moving to a new (free) provider is working well, although we are restricted to 300 mails per day, and there are 221 recipients. We are still looking for a volunteer to take over running of this essential and most useful service to the community. Interested? Please get in touch.
