News from the Beacon Benefice

September is one of those months where there is always a lot happening: the end of summer and family holidays, a new school and college year and a general mood of 'back to work'. Despite the implications, many of us welcome that opportunity for a fresh start with all the potential it brings.

In the Beacon Benefice, September will bring some important celebrations and new beginnings. Our new Rector, Rev Sarah, will formally take up her role across the six parishes of Painswick, Sheepscombe, Cranham, Edge, Pitchcombe and Harescombe from early this month. The landmark moment though, will be on Sunday 17th at 4.00pm, when you are warmly invited to for her formal licensing service in St Mary's, Painswick.

September 6th sees the launch of 'St Mary's Mum's': a weekly café with toys and activities for little ones and coffee and cake for parents, carers and those with bumps across the benefice (nothing formal happening, just a space to chat and make friends). Then on Sunday 24th it will be Painswick's turn to feast in the long held traditions of puppy dog pie, flower crowns and 'clypping buns' for the children. As usual there will be all sorts of entertainments and stalls in the churchyard with the Clypping Service (nothing to do with yew trees and also with its own unique hymn) at 3.00pm. Look out for St Mary's own stall with free activities for families and also Sportily, with games and challenges for all ages.

Our prayers across our churches this month will include all those starting the new year at our village schools, those off to secondary schools further afield and all those beginning college courses, perhaps living away from home for the first time. Every blessing!

Celebrating God's story through stained glass windows

St Cyr's Church in Stinchcombe has used the Church of England's #StainedGlassSummer initiative to engage with families and children in their worshipping community.



The Revd Fiona Crocker, Vicar of Cam and Stinchcombe, says, "The windows in St Cyr's are 19th century and we have quite a lot – almost every window is a stained glass window. We have the apostles, the ascension, the transfiguration, Mary and Jesus – the whole of God's story in one church. It is a truly joyful celebration of stained glass windows."

The windows have been well loved and cared for by the worshipping community. In 2015, the PCC with the Friends of St Cyr, and with village support, raised money for refurbishment of the windows.

"We also use the windows in school lessons, which is a wonderful opportunity to share them with children. Recently we had a class from Cam Everlands Primary School come into the church. We do an 'I spy' activity which the children love, looking for all the things they can spot in the stained glass windows, we also challenge them to see how many angels they can find and incredibly one of the children found what looked like an angel saying #watchandpray.

"The windows are a great celebration of God's story and we use them to inspire the youngsters to design their own stained glass window. As part of that we have talked about the apostles and why they have been celebrated in the windows and what they did in their life — and we ask the young people, 'Just as God thinks the apostles were special God thinks you're special too. What do you think you are going to do in your life, what do you want to be remembered for, and what would your stained glass story be?'

"People are welcome to come in and enjoy the church as a sacred place, whether you have faith or no faith. St Cyr's Church is open every day, we have a disability entrance and electric lift, so it's freely accessible to all. So, we invite you to come and see the stained glass windows for yourselves."

Workshop helps churches welcome adults with learning disabilities

St Barnabas Church, Cheltenham, held a workshop run by the charity Count Everyone In, to discover ways to be more accessible to adults with learning disabilities.



Count Everyone In is a UK charity focusing on this specific area of Christian ministry. The founders, Pete and

Christine Winmill, felt strongly that it was unreasonable to expect adults with learning disabilities in churches to know who Jesus is unless someone helps them to understand, to trust Him and to grow in faith.

They developed Know & Grow workshops to equip churches to communicate the love of Jesus to people with learning disabilities, covering topics like 'What does it mean to be human?', 'Learning disability and the Church', and aspects of faith such as the Bible, music and worship, and signing and symbols.

The Revd Janice Hamilton, Pioneer Minister for West Cheltenham Parish, says, "Seventeen people booked onto our workshop in July including church leaders, ordinands and readers in training, mostly from Anglican churches in Cheltenham but also coming from as far afield as Berkeley, and members of Baptist and Congregational churches too.

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The group included those who work with adults with disabilities in their day job, those who have experience of caring for grown-up children with learning disabilities and many of us with no prior experience. The feedback was very positive and encouraging."

One delegate, who has a son with learning disabilities, said, "I thought it was brilliant and very well run. Can't wait for the second one."

When a permanent resident is no longer in need of the charity's support, or a temporary resident's allocation comes up for re-evaluation, Expressions of Interest are invited from other potential beneficiaries.

If you are interested in being considered as a resident of a Cranham alms-house, please make your interest known to the Trust's chairman, Robert Garratt of Witches Tump, Cranham (robert.j.garratt@btinternet.com).

Expressions of interest are welcome at any time, but specifically for the evaluation taking place now, the deadline is **Saturday 30th September 2023**.

- The primary criteria for selection of residents are need (financial or other) and "Cranhamness".
- Selection of beneficiaries is at the Trustees' discretion, based on interviews with those expressing interest.
- The alms-houses are best suited to single occupancy.
- No parking is provided for residents' vehicles.
- An expression of interest does not constitute a commitment by either party.
- Residents pay a monthly maintenance charge and their own utility bills.

The Trust may, at its discretion convert a temporary allocation into a permanent allocation.

Brimpsfield & Mid-Cotswold Garden Society

It's time again for the Garden Society's Annual Show, in Birdlip Village Hall (nb Birdlip, not Brimpsfield) on Saturday 2nd September. Everyone is welcome from 2.30pm that day to admire the exhibits and to enjoy tea and homemade cakes, with prizegiving and the charity auction (in aid of the volunteer gardeners at the Sue Ryder Hospice in Leckhampton) of some of the produce at 4.00pm. It's always a fun afternoon - we look forward to seeing you there!

September is a good time for taking steps to save money by propagating our plants, whether by taking cuttings or by saving seeds. We have a talk next spring about saving seed, but this is the time of year to do it; look out for seedheads drying on your plants and either collect them as they ripen or put a paper bag over them so that seed falls into it rather than scattering over your garden. Remember that hybrid plants, especially F1 hybrids, will not necessarily come true from seed. Dry the seedheads in a warm place and extract the seeds, separating them from the pods or husks. Either sow the seed fresh, or for less hardy plants store it in paper envelopes (don't forget to label them!), not in plastic which could cause the seed to rot and keep it in a dry place (or even better, in the fridge) until next spring. It's not only ornamentals that can be propagated in this way; if you let your lettuces and other vegetables flower, you can have fresh seed for your kitchen garden too and save even more money by growing your own for free!

Our autumn coffee mornings resume on Saturday 7th October, in Brimpsfield Village Hall, with a talk by member Angela Lerwill about growing up on a traditional farm; more details next month.



CRANHAM FEAST PARADE - SUNDAY 10th SEPT

As part of the Cranham Feast celebrations this year we will be bringing back the Parade (see page 196 of the Cranham book). Rather than braving the A46 and starting as tradition dictates at the Royal William, we will be starting at Overtown Farm. This will allow us to parade down through the Knoll, into the village around the pub and along to the school, giving all areas of the village the opportunity to join in.



The Parade will be led by the village Scout Group but it would be really great if as many village groups could be represented through dressing up, flags, banners or props. As an example the Tennis club could have a few members present holding tennis rackets. The cricket club could come dressed in whites. The new pub committee could come in Lederhosen.

The plan will be to leave Overtown Farm at 1:30pm, walking 1.5 miles, so that we arrive at the church in time for the service to start at 3.00pm.

The hope is to create a 'Feast' atmosphere so there will music and with all the colour and fancy dress, banners and flags it could really brighten up the damp summer. So put your thinking caps on and represent your village group in as imaginative way as possible.

The Church will also be looking to gain sponsorship through the Ride+Stride fundraising weekend event to raise funds towards the Church Organ. Fbworth

I have started seeing wheatears along the Ebworth drive on my way into work. They like to perch on fenceposts between foraging on the ground so are usually quite easy to spot. Will all the unsettled weather we have had it feels like we haven't really had a summer and now we are seeing signs of autumn on its way! There is also a flock of young swallows which like to rest on the fence rails just above the Ebworth car park. It's lovely to watch them hawking over the fields in search of insects to eat. You can tell the young ones from their lack of long tail streamers.



Autumn is the best time to look for fungi as the cooler damper weather stimulates them to fruit and produce mushrooms. Fungi are a hugely diverse and fascinating group of species. Mushrooms can range from football sized giant puffballs to microscopic fruiting bodies found on decaying leaves.

Over the past year Tony Hardware, a local mycologist has been doing a fungi survey across the whole of Ebworth.

Going out throughout the year recording every species he finds. This is no easy task as identification can be very tricky. Many need microscopic examination, sometimes spore prints need to be taken and some need to be

treated with chemicals to see what colour they change! Over the year Tony found an amazing 178 species including 16 species which are new to Gloucestershire including some real rarities! It's amazing to have such an in-depth survey of the site and shows how important the woodlands and unimproved grasslands are for fungi.

As summer ends, we enter the time of year when we start to do our vegetation management at Ebworth. This will include doing some of the ash die back remedial works. This will involve felling dangerous ash trees which are leaning over well used paths. The timber created will be either left in situ to create dead wood habitat which is so important in a woodland ecosystem, especially for invertebrates and fungi. Or if the timber is of a suitable size and falls on a track, we remove it to process into firewood for our biomass boiler up at Ebworth. This heats the whole building and keeps us warm in the winter! Felling trees is a potentially dangerous activity so please heed any warning signs you may encounter during your walk around the woodlands.

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Are you struggling with damp and mould in your home?

At Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswold Districts we saw a very significant rise in the number of people struggling with damp and mould during the winter. Our Research and Campaigns team have been gathering evidence about the problem and the number of clients with the problem has remained high - the number of people with a damp and mould problem was four times higher in April to June this year than the same period last year.

What can you do about damp and mould?

Unfortunately, there are many causes of damp that properties can get and it isn't always easy to work out the cause. The most common types are rising, penetrating, construction and condensation damp. On our website (citizensadvice.org.uk) there is information that may help you work out what type of damp you have, who is responsible and what you can do.

It is important to keep homes well-heated and well-ventilated to prevent damp and mould. You may be eligible for help to insulate and heat your home and should visit our website to find out more. If you are on a low income, you may be able to get help with heating and wider essentials from the Household Support Fund.

Drying wet clothes on radiators and blocking air vents may make condensation damp worse. It's best to dry clothes outside if you can or in the bathroom with the door closed and the window open or fan on.

What should your landlord do if you are a tenant?

It can be difficult to work out if your landlord is responsible - check your tenancy agreement for mentions of repairs and damp. One of the most common causes of damp is condensation. Our website has advice on things that can make the problem worse that may also impact the landlord taking responsibility for repairs.

A landlord will have to act in relation to damp if it makes the property unsafe for someone to live in. This could be for example, if it is making the tenant or a member of their family ill. The landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, like if heaters are broken. If the damp has damaged items that the landlord is responsible for, such as carpets and window frames, they'll likely have to cover the cost of repairs.

If your landlord is responsible for the damp in your property but doesn't act, there are steps you can take, such as reporting them to the local authority. If you're in social housing, you might also be able to use the landlord's formal complaints procedure. If you are thinking of leaving a fixed term tenancy agreement early, do speak to us first, as there might be better ways to approach the issue.

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
