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A Letter from The Clergy

It is a delight on behalf of all our parish communities, and our magazine readers, to welcome Rev Sarah Haslam as the new Rector of our Benefice. Sarah has been working with us since earlier in the year and has already engaged with the life of our churches and villages. At the service on 17th September, she took on the official role of Rector, and with her family has moved into the Rectory in Painswick.

The role of clergy has changed markedly in the past generation or so. In the 'old days' (within many of our lifetimes) each village had its own vicar, often living in rambling, cold vicarages next door to the church. The vicar had responsibility for nearly all the activities of the church: leading the services and preaching every Sunday, looking after the pastoral needs of their 'flock' and even cutting the vicarage lawn ready for the church fete! The rest of us, the members of the communities, were somehow passengers in the life of the church, usually just attending and at best helping in some small way.

These days – and I believe this to be a very positive change - churches function differently. The change did not come about because of fewer clergy, or as a vague evolution, but around the 1990's theologians and church leaders gained new understanding of what a church, in a biblical sense, was meant to be. In this new model everyone is encouraged to be involved: each person contributing from their skills and experience as they are able, with everyone's contribution valued and all sharing responsibility for the running, the vision and the future of the church.

The role of the clergy has therefore changed markedly. No longer is the vicar running a 'one man band' (and it was a man of course!), but their role is one of leader, enabler and encourager. The selection process for those interested in being ordained, and their subsequent training, has changed accordingly, with much emphasis on leadership qualities and skills.

So, as Sarah arrives officially among us, it is not the time for us to step back from what we are doing – not at all. But rather for us all to look forward to working with her, whether we would regard ourselves as regular 'church goers' or not: together discussing ideas, sharing vision, and being courageous to offer whatever skills and time we have to take the life of our churches forward.

I know that Sarah will be looking forward to meeting everyone, and attending events in our different villages whenever she can. Do look out for her and introduce yourself.

Rugby - an evasion sport with the potential to encounter God

During the Men's Rugby World Cup 2023, Richard Witham, Head of Sport and Faith for Sportily, shares how his passion for the sport links with his passion for his Christian faith.

"As a child, I found a love for sport, especially Rugby Union, long before a love for Jesus. It will come as no surprise that I am pretty excited about the Men's Rugby World Cup, which runs to 28th October – work colleagues and family might find



me harder than usual to get hold of. "I look back at those moments of epiphany where rugby and faith have collided for me:

"In sixth form – When I had just started out on the adventure of following God as a sixth former in Bristol and looking at the touch line to see a youth leader from church giving up their Saturday afternoon to come and watch me.

"In scripture – Enjoying and accepting Romans 12, verse 1. Our worship is always in response to what God has done for us and for who God is. For me, this sense of giving my whole self to God is true and proper worship was transformative especially this direct link to my physical body. Of course, this is not just around physical activity and sport but worship for me is hugely rooted in this.

"Through coaching – I have re-learnt how to coach others and it is very different to how I was taught. I can picture where I was standing as the coach educator talked us through creating a positive learning environment, letting the players play conditioned games and then as a coach asking the right question to help the players truly learn and encourage them to question what they are doing and why. This sounded very much like the way Jesus taught his disciples – through them doing, joining in and through two-way questions. I can trace this moment to the birth of 'Play sport talk life', a phrase at the heart of the what and the how of Sportily.

"During the Rugby World Cup, I will be aware of the natural conversations that can come from it with friends, family, those at the rugby club and young people through Sportily, around success and disappointment, enjoyment, beauty and creativity.

"I will enjoy the post-match hymns and prayers from some of the countries and players and join in when they openly give glory to God. I will enjoy watching some top-class rugby and be thankful to God. And each match I watch I will pause and pray for those countries – for the challenging situations they face, maybe for people and organisations that are linked to those I know."

St Mary's celebrates first full immersion baptism

St Mary's in Wotton-under-Edge held its first full immersion baptism – which coincided with the 740th anniversary of the church's dedication.

Full immersion baptism, as the name suggests, is when a person is fully covered in water by submerging under

the surface as part of the baptism ceremony, signifying their new life in Christ.

Rachel Tooley, who has been a member of the worshipping community at St Mary's for a year, decided she wanted to be baptised and chose full immersion baptism.

The Revd Lesley Hewish, Priest in Charge for Tyndale Benefice, says, "Rachel joined our congregation last summer, along with her life partner, Shelley, who has already been baptised. It has been a real joy walking with these two women on their journey with Jesus.

"Shelley helped me baptise Rachel, so we all got very wet; and so did the rest of the congregation as everyone renewed their baptism vows, which involved a branch of rosemary and lots of baptism pool water being shared.

Lesley says, "We are praying this will be the first of many full immersion baptisms and more members of our community explore together what it means to be a follower of Jesus. We are therefore confident that more candidates will join them for confirmation next year. God is doing amazing things."

Our thanks to everyone involved in our Annual Show in September – another successful day with lots of splendid exhibits, showcasing our members' talents! If you didn't enter this year, maybe you should start working on your entries for next year!





Our next event will be our first autumn Coffee Morning on Saturday 7th October in Brimpsfield Village Hall; our speaker will be Angela Lerwill, who will talk about growing up on her family's traditional farm in Sussex. Refreshments will be available from 10.30am, with the talk starting at 11am and, as always, everyone is welcome!

October may feel like a month when the garden starts to wind down, but



there are still jobs to be done, and seeds to sow. Broad beans (a winter-hardy variety – try Aquadulce Claudia) can be sown, and garlic can also go into the ground this month while there is still warmth in the soil. Under cover, you can make a first sowing of sweet peas for early flowers next spring, and salads can also be sown in containers for fresh leaves during the winter; they will grow slowly but can be cropped on a 'cut and come again' basis if you cut them 1cm above the base.

The weather at this time of year can be unpredictable; keep an eye on the forecast and be prepared to water if we get a dry spell, or to provide protection if it turns chilly; it's safest to be ready to bring tender plants under cover around now, and certainly by the end of the month. Last year we had a very mild November, but this was followed by a sudden very cold snap, so better safe than sorry! Remember that, even if the daytime temperatures are warm, it's much colder at night. Dahlias should be left until the first frosts have blackened the foliage, but other frost-tender specimens should be brought indoors before the cold weather hits.





Ebworth

It is a great time of year to lookout for migrating birds. Some passing through on their way south to their wintering grounds in Africa and some returning to our shores to enjoy our (relatively) warm winter climate after breeding in Scandinavia or Iceland.

The drive to the Ebworth Centre can be a good place to look out for wheatears passing through on their way south. The organic fields of Overtown Farm are also a great place to look out for redwings and fieldfares newly arrived from Scandinavia. They are very hungry after their long journey and the organic soils offer the perfect protein and calorie rich source of invertebrates.

You may have noticed some works happening in Workmans Wood recently. This is natural flood management (NFM) works which is being done in partnership with Stroud District Council. These works aim to slow the flow of water running down the head waters of the River Frome. This increases the ability of the land to slowly soak up water which reduces peak flows during periods of heavy rainfall. This intern reduces flooding further downstream. It is much more cost effective than hard infrastructure interventions and it creates some excellent wildlife habitat in the process.



There have been three types of works happening at Ebworth:

- "Woody structures in the stream course" This involves felling sycamore and dying ash trees so they fall into the stream course. This creates leaky dams which holds up the flow of water. It also creates deeper areas of water in the stream which are used as a cooler refuge for invertebrates during hot, dry spells.
- "Water attenuation area" This is effectively creating temporary ponds in the woodland. In times of higher rainfall these areas are full of water but in dry spells they may dry out. These act as water storage areas holding water back and slowly releasing it. Temporary, or ephemeral ponds are great for wildlife because populations of larger predatory animals cannot build up. Hence creating a haven for aquatic invertebrate life.
- "Stage zero the stream course" This involves using nearby silt to fill in any deep channels the stream has created. This causes the stream course to spread out across the width of the valley. This stops the water rushing down a narrow straight cannel and instead meander down the valley.

In periods of high rainfall the water is able to use the whole width of the valley not just the narrow channel. These both help to again slow the flow of water down the valley. It also creates a great wet woodland habitat. We will be using these newly created wet areas to plant alder to restore the alder carr/wet woodland habitat at Ebworth.



We have also been restoring some of the drystone walls across Ebworth. This has been through a number of different methods:
Volunteers, paid contactors and hosting training events.



TRAC 2023 for me was the highlight of my year! There were around 77 young people who attended and it was a great privilege to be able to serve them for the week.

It was a week full of games, activities, exploring the Christian faith, food and sleepless nights! Some of the activities we did included Go Karting, Ziplines, Raft-Building, Archery, Multi-Sports, a Slip and Slide (if you never seen one google it they're pretty wild) and much more!

The theme of this years TRAC 2023 Summer Camp was WORTH. We explored the idea of where we get our worth, what does God say about our worth and how do we live it out. Most of the young people were not Christians at the beginning of the week but by the end a good number had decided to make decisions to follow Jesus or wanted to know more about the Christian faith when they return home.

We had a fancy dress night which went down great and a bon-fire on the

last night where the young people could share some of their highlights. Listening to many of them who testified to how their lives were changed due to TRAC was very touching and reminded us all afresh why we do what we do.

Notes from the Chair

Meetings - Our latest meeting was brought forward to August 29th and we had a very full agenda. Complete minutes are published, firstly in draft form, on our website:

www.cranhampc.org.uk, here are a few snippets.

Public Speaking - There is always a slot for this at beginning of meeting. A resident echoed many peoples views when he heavily criticised three things, namely the general state of the road surfaces, branches overhanging the highway scratching cars and causing a safety hazard, and finally many aspects of the undergrounding of the electricity cables that has caused so much damage and inconvenience. Council completely agreed and all these matters had already been actively pursued, direct with National Grid and Gloucestershire County Council.

Vacancy - We still have one vacancy and we can co-opt someone onto the Council. Anyone interested should get in touch for more details.

Playing Field - We are going out to tender for the grass cutting contract for next year, unfortunately we were let down this year. Also, there is concern about the trees bordering the field because of ash dieback disease and their size. We will be seeking expert advice.

Dog Fouling - There remains a problem of irresponsible dog owners (not necessarily Cranhamites) failing to clear up after their pets. The Cranham Common Trust has kindly offered to fund additional bins, and our new Police Community Service Officer, PCSO Nicky Wood has agreed to carry out patrols along with SDC Environmental Officers (who are empowered to issue on the spot fines) in order to further raise awareness.

Next Meeting - Scheduled for Tuesday 7th November at 7pm, on the agenda will be draft budget for next year.

Cranham Common News

The largely wet summer has resulted in proliferative growth of grass and everything else on the common this year, plenty for the cows to eat now they have returned. As the nights draw in heralding the approach of autumn, for me it is a time to reflect on the glorious displays of flora we have enjoyed on the common this summer. From the early cowslips through the orchid season and now the late comers, the scabious and wild carrot. The common has been lovely this year.

Who looks after the common?

There are quite a lot of different organisations and individuals involved in looking after Cranham Common, and it can get somewhat confusing. So it is useful to clarify who does what.

There are 4 primary organisations involved with the Common.

- Cranham Common Trust (CCT)
- Cranham Common Management Committee (CCMC)
- Natural England (NE)
- National Trust (NT)

Cranham Common forms part of the Cotswold Commons & Beechwoods National Nature Reserve, which has statutory oversight by Natural England on behalf of the Secretary of State.

The **Cranham Common Trust** owns most, but not all, of the grassland of Cranham Common plus the village pond. CCT was originally made up of people who donated to the purchase of the Common in 2008 and welcomes new members from the village or anyone with an interest in the common. Cranham Common Trust is run by a board of 8 directors elected by its members for 3 years at the AGM. The board directors are all volunteers and receive no financial reward.

A number of other parties also own modest parts of the Common, including the National Trust, The Scout Association, Yew Tree Cottage, Crofters Hollow, Shepherds Piece, plus a number of other neighbouring properties.

Natural England have a lease, granted by Cranham Common Trust, over the core part of the grassland which is a designated Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), a status which gives it high statutory protection. Natural England are responsible for the environmental management of the SSSI and NNR, organise events, and also pay Cranham Common Trust an annual rent which is sufficient to cover the Trust's overheads (mostly public liability insurance).

The Cranham Common Management Committee includes representatives of residents in the Parish, and many other stakeholders including graziers who historically used to graze animals on the common, Parish Council, Natural England and National Trust. The CCMC membership is elected at the Cranham Parish Council Annual meeting.

CCMC undertake the day-to-day management of the whole of the Common (not just the NNR and SSSI), under the chairmanship of Liz Hayden. CCMC works closely with CCT, Natural England and National Trust with the common goal of maintaining Common in optimum condition to benefit a wide range of plants, birds and invertebrates. In winter months CCMC organise work parties to manage the scrub on the Common.

National Trust own the cattle that graze the common. The National Trust are responsible for the welfare of the cattle. Matt Watts from NT is responsible for the welfare of the cows. History of the Alms Houses

George Jones was a philanthropic gentleman who lived at Whitley ASSOCIATION Court in Upton St Leonards. He was the generous benefactor to many such schemes as the Cranham Alms Houses.

The first documented evidence we have of the cottages existence go back to 23 March 1804, when Mr William Verrinder owner of the Old House, when it was the Black Horse and a pottery, paid £100 to Richard Faulks yeoman of Bisley and John Portlock yeoman of Cranham for them. His property passed on his death to his son Joseph, who in turn sold the cottages (Alms houses) to Joseph Lovegrove, together with other properties. Following Joseph Lovegrove's death, a trust was formed to arrange his affairs which included the rector, Rev William Moore. The sale was made to George Jones by the trustees of Joseph Lovegroves will in 1867, for £150. At that time the cottages were occupied by Henry Pope and John Ecups.

George Jones died in 1861 but he had established the George Jones Charity and on the 26th January 1868 it gave the two cottages to new trustees to create the Alms houses, trustees included the Rector and churchwardens with the following proviso they were - 'to be occupied rent free by one widow and her family, or two poor widows without families, such poor widows or widows to be nominated from time to time by the Rector and churchwardens etc etc' George Jones Charily also gave to the trustees to hold the sum of £162 7s 7d invested at three percent in Consolidated Bank Annuities, upon the income thereof to keep the cottages and property in substantial repair, and pay all rates and taxes if any, and keep the property insured against fire. As these men died or retired others have taken their place.

By 1900 only one of the cottages was occupied due to the local housing authority describing it as below standard. One of the trustees in 1963 was Colonel James Carne VC and according to a newspaper report on February 22 of that year — 'he was full of optimism that the alms Houses could be saved, an architect had prepared plans that would cost £2,300, improvement grants of £800 would be available of the £1,500, £200 would be offered by the National Association of Alms houses. The remainder raised over a period of 20 years from the National Assistance Board at a rate of £1 12s 6s weekly, to be paid by those in the accommodation.' Sadly, a later newspaper report said the plans had been put on hold as the planned drainage scheme had stalled.

It was not until the early 1970's when the promised introduction of main drainage implemented and the properties could then undergo the necessary renovations to make them habitable again. Mr Alec Brown took over the trusteeship from Col Carne, and together with the Parish council under the chairmanship of David Pritchard work progressed. Tenders for the work in 1976 ranged from £11,700 00 to £12,799.50. Building work was undertaken by C & A builders and took until the end of the 1970's to complete. The trustees to this day have constantly maintained the integrity of the buildings. The rules as to who should inhabit the alms houses are no longer so restrictive, and they continue to provide rented accommodation for the village.

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
