A Letter from The Clergy

'Life....interrupted'

As I sit at my desk writing this letter, I can see a doe resting contentedly in my garden. She reminds me of the importance of stopping and 'taking a beat', as they say, which is true at any time of year but certainly in the time of Advent and Christmas. There is so much going on around here! (That is why we are encouraging people to take time out and come to an Advent Quiet Day in Painswick on Friday 8th December, to explore 'The Poetry of Advent'... but I digress! (see page 14 for poster)).

For my family and I, this Christmas will be our first Christmas in the benefice, and I'm really excited about that. Unsurprisingly, I love Christmas! However, let's face it, Christmas can be pretty daunting. At this time of year the temptation for many of us is to put your head down and plough through all the nativities and festivities, concerts and carols, shopping and wrapping, cooking, cleaning, eating and washing up... Until that special moment *after* Christmas. That moment when you close the door and exhale with relief, knowing you can finally 'relax' after all the costly busyness. Surely there's something wrong about that.

I have recently been reflecting on that first Christmas when, amidst all the busyness of getting ready to have an unplanned baby, a young girl and her husband-to-be set off on a journey to Bethlehem for a census. It would have been the last thing they would have needed at the time, I'm sure.

And yet it was all part of God's incredible plan. Centuries before, prophets had foretold what would come to pass. In countries far away, 'wise men' would see a star and commit to follow it on a journey that would take them years to complete. In fields nearby, exhausted shepherds at work would stop what they were doing to go and find a baby: Jesus, born to save us from all that is wrong in the world.

The story of the very first Christmas is an incredible one, one that interrupted the routine and busyness of many peoples' lives. If you read the Bible and learn more about the life of the baby as he grows up, you soon see that God's plan was to interrupt all of our lives, to save us, and the plan to do so is ongoing.

So as I continue to experience lots of daunting 'firsts' here and reflect on what God is doing, I wonder how you will allow God to interrupt your life, your usual plans this month? Perhaps you might put aside that stack of paperwork for now and come and sing carols. Or just sit for five minutes with a cup of tea and think about the people you love, and give God a quiet thank you for them.

However you spend your time this month, I hope and pray you will have a really Happy Christmas, and experience it - perhaps for the first time - as a wonderful sign of allowing the God of love to interrupt our daily lives to show us something better: the good news of his Son who was born to interrupt and save us. I also pray our faith will grow, and may we continue to look to and trust in God for more interruption to come. Amen.

From the Shorter Oxford Dictionary.

You do not need to have children at home to host!

What is the Posada (see also bottom of page 8 opposite)?

The Posada is a custom that started in Spain or Mexico at least 500 years ago when people visited each others' homes to bless their Nativity scene. They would start on 16th December and travel around until Christmas Eve; 9 days, to represent the 9 months that Mary was pregnant with Jesus. Each night they would go to a different home in a different part of the village. When they arrived at their destination they would knock on the door and ask for a room. The head of the house would say he had no room, just like the innkeeper in Bethlehem, but eventually he would let them in. Everybody would go inside, light a candle besides the nativity scene and bless it.

How do we do it in Cranham?

As many previous 'host families' are aware; Cranham now has 2 nativity sets that we call the Posada. Throughout advent these move from home to home, staying overnight before being passed on to find another resting place.

When does it all happen?

We start with the first families receiving the Posada at the Advent carol service at 11am on Sunday 3rd December.

After travelling from home to home each night they return to the church in time for the Crib Service on 24th December at 4pm.

If we host the Posada, what exactly will we be doing?

The Posada families are delightful wooden nativity scenes. They will arrive, ready for you to set up, in their own box with the Posada prayer and an advent candle for you to light for the night(s) you host the family.

Please join us for this special service setting the Posada on its journey.



Brimpsfield & Mid-Cotswold Garden Society

Christmas is a time for traditions, and the subject of the talk at our December coffee morning meeting, 'Folklore and More', should help to get us in the mood for this most traditional festival. Come along to Brimpsfield Village Hall on Saturday 2nd December to find out more; coffee and home-made cake on offer from 10.30am with the talk starting at 11.00am. Everyone is welcome!

Christmas of course is also a time for giving and receiving presents, which sometimes take the form of plants to brighten up our indoor space. Houseplants differ in their requirements, but in general they want to be kept relatively cool, away from radiators and draughts, and don't need too much watering at this time of year. Even those that don't normally like to be in bright sunlight can tolerate being near a window in the darker months, but remember not to leave them on a windowsill when the curtains are closed at night; it will be too cold for them there.

If your Christmas cactus has no buds on it, check that it is not receiving any artificial light at night; it needs a few hours of total darkness to make it flower. Should you receive potted cyclamen, remember to water them from the base, as the leaves will rot if they get wet; they will go dormant in summer, but can be brought back into flower for next winter. The same is true of amaryllis; last year's bulb can be re-potted now, fed and watered, and should bloom again for you.

COOKING A HUSBAND

(Successful only if followed to the letter.)

(Successful only if followed to the letter.)

A Good many HUSBANDS are utterly SPOILED by MISMANAGEMENT. Some women keep them constantly in HOT WATER; others let them FREEZE by their carelessness and indifference; some keep them in a STEW by irritating ways and words. Others ROAST THEM. Some keep them in a pickle all their lives. It cannot be supposed that any HUSBAND will be TENDER and GOOD if mistreated in this way, but they are really DELICIOUS when properly treated. In SELECTING your HUSBAND you should not be guided by the SILVERY APPEARANCE as in buying a mackerel; nor the GOLDEN TINT. as if you wanted salmon. BE SURE you select him yourself, at tastes differ. Do not go to the MARKET for him, as the best are always brought to YOUR door. It is far better to have none, unless you will patiently learn how to COOK him. A preserving kettle of finest porcelain is best, but if you have only an earthenware vessel it will do. Be very careful that the linen in which he is wrapped is nicely washed and mended, with the required number of buttons and strings sewn on. The him in the kettle by a strong silk cord called COMFORT, as the one called DUTY is apt to be WEAK and FRIEDD HUSBAND apt to fly out of the kettle and be burned and crusty on the edges since, like CRABS and LOBSTERS, YOU HAVE IO COOK THEM ALIVE. Make a clear, streaty fire out of LOVE, NEATNESS and CHEERFULNESS. Set him as near this as seems to AGREE with him. If he SPUTTERS and FIZZLES, do not be auxious, some HUSBANDS do this until quite done. Add a little sugar in the form that confectioners call KISSES, but on no account use VINEGAR or PEPPER. A little SPICE IMPROVES SOME species, but it must be used with JUDGMENT. Do not stick any sharp instruments into him to see if he is tender—use your rolling pin—discreetly—and make sure. One in TIME saves NINE. You cannot fail to know when your undertaking is a success. Friends of the Black Horse News

We are very excited to be writing the first of our regular updates of "what's going on" at our Community owned Black Horse .



To give a quick recap, Dan, Mark and Marcia worked incredibly hard for almost 3 years to go through the process of applying on our behalf for a Government Community Ownership Fund of £250,000. This required an equal amount of £250,000 to be raised in shares from the community and incredibly, this was surpassed by an additional £10,900. The sale completed on October 25th this year, and now the Management Committee are working hard to ensure the remaining budget of approximately £160,000 is used wisely and in accordance with the guidance of the Community Ownership Fund.

While we cannot state every single item that needs addressing and it is highly likely we will find additional items that require attention once we start the improvement work, we do have a rationale for the work we are planning.

Firstly, we must undertake work to ensure the Black Horse is compliant with all fire and health and safety legislation. This is forming much of the work and is anticipated to be a major part of the expenditure. Secondly, we will undertake repairs that will prevent the building from deteriorating further and to make good items that are likely to fail in the near future. Thirdly, we will carry out work to reduce running costs to enable the Black Horse to be run as a viable commercial venture and to bring in revenue.

Due to the nature of the way the purchase was funded, several of the items needed 3 quotes and some had to be sent out for tender. Inspections have been carried out by the appropriate professional bodies, checking Fire and security, electrics, asbestos, the chimneys, the building structure, etc. By the time you are reading this, we hope to have nominated our building company and work will commence as soon as possible.

The open morning on Sunday 5th November was really well attended and we hope you were able to see that the work required is extensive and why the premises needs to be shut for the next few months. You can appreciate that this decision was not taken lightly but is totally necessary.

We are grateful for all who have come forward to volunteer and will soon be able to have an idea of timings for all the various jobs required that can be done by the community. We have also noted and discussed all the suggestions given, some which the committee had considered and researched in the last few months but for the moment will not be viable, and some may be undertaken in the future when we have further budget.

Our budget can be increased by more shareholders either joining The Friends of the Black Horse or purchasing additional shares at £50 a share .



Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswolds shares tips for how to save money on your energy bills

As people across Stroud and Cotswolds Districts face another winter of high energy bills, Citizens Advice shares how small changes can make a big difference when it comes to saving energy and lowering costs.

The charity has teamed up with the Energy Saving Trust to share advice on getting help if you are struggling with energy bills and tips on how to cut energy costs around the home.

People can make simple changes to save money on their energy bills and don't need to wait until the colder months to do so. These include:

- Washing clothes at 30°C could save around £15 per year and reducing the number of wash cycles by one per week could save a further £15.
- Reducing shower time to four minutes could save a typical household as much as £75 a year.
- Swapping one bath a week for a four-minute shower could save an average of £17 a year.
- Avoiding overfilling the kettle could save around £12 a year on electricity.
- Draught-proofing windows and doors will help your home feel warmer and could save around £50 a year on bills.
- Turning appliances off at the wall/plug when you're not using them could save an average of £60 a year.
- Turning the thermostat down by 1°C could save around £115 a year.

Installing a Smart Meter can help people get better control of their energy use and budgets. Smart meters come with an In-home Display Unit (IHD) that shows how much you're using and its cost, almost as you use it – in real time. The government has instructed all energy suppliers to offer households a smart meter by 2025. You don't have to have one but may benefit from reduced tariffs with some suppliers. The government estimates that customers with smart meters save an average of £50 a year.

Check you're getting all the support you're entitled to...



Lifestyle changes won't be possible for everyone and may not be enough to cover the hole in household budgets caused by higher prices, so Citizens Advice is also urging people to check they're getting all the support they're entitled to. This could include:

- Checking what benefits you're entitled to by using a benefits calculator.
- Warm Home Discount a £150 annual discount if you get certain benefits.
- Cold weather payments payments if you get certain benefits and the weather is extremely cold.
- Grants from your energy supplier to help you pay off debts you may owe.

If you owe money to your energy supplier, you should speak to them as soon as possible. They're responsible for helping you find a way to pay your bills.

Elizabeth Hall, Chief Officer of Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswold Districts said: "We know lots of people are worried about how they'll cover their energy bills this winter. So it's important people know what support they're entitled to and how to cut back on energy costs where they can. Every day we hear from people who are already doing everything they can, but sky-high costs mean it's simply not enough. We want to remind anyone struggling they're not alone, if you need support managing your bills, please contact us."




