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A Letter from The Clergy



Happy New Year, everyone! Hasn't it been a busy Christmas? - but now the trees have been removed and the decorations taken down, and a sort of normality resumes. What does 2024 hold in store? What resolutions have you made? And maybe already broken....? What to expect?

On the Church's timeline the festival to immediately follow Christmas is The Epiphany (Jan 6th on the Julian Calendar). It's the day when the three kings, or wise men (depending on how you understand the Bible text) finally completed their journey and arrived to give their gifts and worship to Jesus. They had spent a long time studying the stars and Scriptures, working out their meaning and looking for One who, they hoped, would change the destiny of the world. They weren't far wrong; we still date our calendar from that momentous, worldchanging event - even if these days we label the date CE (Common Era) rather than AD (*anno domini*: in the year of Our Lord)!

In France the Epiphany is called The Day of The Kings and tradition involves "la galette des rois" - which is a cake usually made of puff pastry filled with frangipane. It's also traditional to hide a small charm in the cake (called the 'fève'). The youngest child hides under the table and distributes the slices randomly. The person who finds the 'fève' in their slice is the King or Queen and wears a crown for the rest of the day. Does that mean they are meant to be a little bit wiser for the day? - let's hope!

Actually, the event has the potential of being extended; some countries still use the Gregorian Calendar, and so for them the wise men don't arrive until 19th Jan. The searching goes on....

As someone has said: "Wise men (& women?) still seek Him". Have a blessed 2024!



Extracts from The Messenger – January 2024

Family baptised together at outdoor service



One Sunday, in November 2023, in a tent in the churchyard of St Mary's Kempsford, three young candidates experienced a special baptism service.

The family service at St Mary's Kempsford meets outdoors all year round and focuses on learning about God and worshipping him in the beauty of creation. A team from St Mary's, along with the Revd Kim, plan and

facilitate the service, with the children and their connection to God and His creation at the forefront of the planning each month.

In a first for this worshipping community, two families asked if they could have their children baptised in the outdoor setting. After some planning, the service took place, in the late-afternoon darkness.

Rory, age 10, was baptised first as he was also going to be godfather to his cousin, Magdalena, age 2. He made the sign of the cross with oil on Magdalena's head while the Revd Kim gave the blessing, and he and his sister, Eden, age 7, also anointed one another. The children came forward to blow bubbles in celebration at the end, before going off to search for bats with their torches and toast marshmallows in the fire.

Kim says, "It was a wonderful experience as we thought together about Jesus coming as light in the darkness, and how He is with us through all the ups and downs of life." Read more: https://bit.ly/BaptismOutdoors

Could you have a gift for chaplaincy?

Chaplains are people who step out in faith to listen, show compassion and be alongside people in their joys, sadness and ordinary lives. Sometimes serving prisons, schools, hospitals or sports clubs, they represent God's love to the people they find themselves among. The Revd Canon Simon Witcombe, Senior Chaplain, University of Gloucestershire, said, "I've been a University Chaplain for six years now. It's a great role,



very different from my previous life as a parish priest - and I love it!

There are so many things that you could say about chaplaincy. It's a way of being with the 95% of people who don't usually come to church, it's a witness to the presence and the love of God 'out there' – where people meet, where they work, in places of need, in all sorts of places and it gives us new opportunities to listen to people and to today's culture."

There are a huge variety of chaplains in our diocese and county. As well as the better-known chaplaincies in hospitals, prisons, schools and universities, there are also waterways chaplains on the canals, racecourse chaplains, services and cadet chaplains, Anna chaplains working with older people, wellbeing chaplains, agricultural chaplains and many others.

Simon continues, "I would love to see us encouraging chaplaincy in many more areas – law courts, shopping centres, towns and villages, festivals, industrial sites – the possibilities are endless. And I also believe that in our churches there are many people who have the necessary gifts. I hope that our new network will become a springboard for many more working in this wonderful ministry."

Simon has created a network for all those who work in chaplaincy – lay and ordained, voluntary and paid, full time or just a couple of hours a week. The next meeting will be on Wednesday 31st January from 3.30pm to 5pm in the Chapel at Francis Close Hall Campus, Cheltenham. All those involved in chaplaincy of any kind are welcome to go along. Brimpsfield & Mid-Cotswold Garden Society



We wish you all a very happy, and colourful, 2024! Got a (real) Christmas tree to dispose of? The charity JustHelping will collect it for a small donation to Longfield Hospice and will take it to Painswick's Rococo Garden for shredding to top-dress the paths there. Two good deeds in one!

January is a time for making plans for the year ahead, rather than for doing much in the garden, but there are still jobs that can be done this month. You can sow seed of aubergines and peppers, including chillies, and a few bedding plants such as lobelia; but while they will benefit from the longer growing season, bear in mind that they will need to be kept indoors until the weather warms up enough for them to go into the greenhouse, and if your windowsill space is limited, it might be better to sow later in winter. One flower that needs less heat and can be sown in the next few weeks is sweet peas; they will still need some protection, such as a cold greenhouse, but can put up with lower temperatures and can be moved outdoors as early as April if the weather isn't too chilly.

Other jobs that can be done now are pruning of free-standing apple and pear trees; if you need advice, the RHS website has guides including how to prune young trees and how to renovate an old one. Some deciduous shrubs that flower in the second half of the year, such as buddleja, can also be pruned between now and March; cut your buddleja down to knee-height and it will regrow quickly (long, straight prunings can be used as beanpoles). Leave evergreens until the spring, though.

The Garden Society's next meeting is on 3rd February, with a talk on saving your own seed; more details next month.

Coro Camino:

A small group of friends, most of whom sing with local choral society, Philomusica, came together in 2019 to perform concerts along the route of the Camino de Santiago in northern Spain and to walk sections of the Camino. A similar, equally successful tour was undertaken in spring 2023.

The choir has also been invited to perform at local fund-raising events, including a Tewkesbury Abbey to Gloucester Cathedral Pilgrimage, the Gloucester Salvation Army 2022 Charity Concert and in Gloucester Cathedral as part of the 2023 Cloister Challenge event (raising funds for the homeless).

Membership of this small choir is bookended (in terms of vocal range) by Cranham resident Tom Daltry and daughter Becky (Cranham residents will remember Becky's role in creating the lockdown village Christmas Nativity video in 2020 and in running a children's singing workshop). The choir is led by Kathryn Jeffree who frequently performs as a soloist locally.

The Organ Restoration Fund:

The Church organ (built in 1894 by leading organ makers Lewis and Co) plays a vital role in supporting the musical life of the Church, usually in the capable hands of Beryl. A recent independent report indicates that it is in need of a major overhaul, the last such overhaul having been undertaken more than 50 years ago. 3 months of work is required, which will involve partial dismantling of the instrument in order to enable repairs to be made and all parts to be thoroughly cleaned.

This work will prevent further deterioration in the operation of the organ and ensure that the Church and the Cranham community have a fully functional instrument for many years to come.

The cost of this work is likely to be in the region of $\pounds 26,000$. The Church will need to use reserves to cover much of this cost, but additional funding is required and a series of fund-raising events is being planned for this purpose – watch this space!

Please do come to the concert to enjoy the music, the tea and cakes and to support this key village cause.

Woodchester Mansion – An Unfinished Masterpiece

A talk given to the Cranham Local History Society

on 7th December by Liz Davenport

Over the hill from the Woodchester villages, in a deep valley, walled around as a deer park in the early 17th century, and to this day remarkably secluded, lies Woodchester Mansion. It's known to everyone in the area by reputation, as are the grounds, now owned by the National Trust. As our speaker, the Mansion Archivist, Liz Davenport, explained, it is a quite remarkable place.

Under the ownership of the Ducie family the original hunting lodge became a smart Georgian house. Either side of the turn of the nineteenth century legendary garden designers Capability Brown and Humphrey Repton were both consulted about the park, and it may be that the lakes higher up the valley were to Repton's design. But all the while the house, Spring Park, was steadily deteriorating. The second Earl Ducie sold it to the son of a Liverpool merchant, one William Leigh, who had money to spare, and as a newly converted Catholic had plans for a church and a monastery and the unlikely aspiration to convert the working men of Stroud to Catholicism. By 1853 both church and monastery were operational. (Only the church survives.) But Leigh's plans to improve the house were met with harsh words from the eminent architect, Augustus Putin: 'a more hopeless case of repairs I never saw.'

Leigh didn't get far with Pugin. To build a new house he employed a prominent architect, Charles Hansom (brother of the inventor of the hansom cab), and a local man, Benjamin Bucknell, to work alongside him. At an early stage Bucknell took over from Hansom. They created a never-to-be-finished masterpiece, a coming together of English vernacular and French Gothic, both increasingly in vogue. Liz Davenport highlighted the way the buttresses support the interior arches which in turn hold up the roof and interior walls. What are missing of course are the floors. And all the while craftsmen had been at work. At roof level four gargoyles, two dogs, a wild boar and a fox, channel water from the roof away from the building. Buildings back then didn't have damp courses. The roof bosses of the extraordinary chapel depict local flora, in one case, cowslips, and the detail is remarkable. But situated where they are, out of sight, they are a wonderful indulgence. Other bosses feature Leigh's dogs and two green men. The bathroom has a bath carved out of a single block of stone. Corridors are vaulted and have a decidedly ecclesiastical feel.

It was a slow, very slow, build, linked to the resources the Leighs had available. In 1874 Bucknell estimated a cost of £7000 for completing the house. Willie Leigh, William's son and heir, didn't have the money. Annual running costs Bucknell estimated at £7000-8000 and in 1878 he headed off to Algiers. By the 1890s the mansion was badly run down. Under Willie's daughter and son there were plans to finish it, but it never happened. Plans for a monastery (again) and a hospital failed to materialise, and troops moved in during the Second World War. In 1988 the house was bought by Stroud District Council and it's now run by the Woodchester Mansion Trust. Every visitor today will be aware of the bats, and they may have heard of the paranormal sessions. House tours are popular, and you can enjoy coffees and teas in wonderful surroundings. A big thank you to Liz for a delightful talk.

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
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
