

A Letter from The Clergy



Dear friends,

I've just finished giving the study a Spring Clean. Actually, it would probably be more accurate to say that I've just given it a good tidy up, which is well overdue. I can now see parts of the desk which have remained hidden for some time.

Spring, which for us began on Wednesday the 20th of March, brings a sense of change and renewal. The clocks have gone forward, which means we see more of the day and the *light* it brings. Curtains are opened earlier and closed later as the days gradually lengthen. Many who find the dark days depressing and difficult to cope with will be feeling much better as the light seems to shut out the darkness. Right at the beginning of John's gospel, talking about Jesus, we read that *'the light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it'*. Spring is a reminder that ultimately light is better than darkness.

Spring also brings with it a sense of the triumph of *life* over death. My grass, which has changed little over the past five or six months has suddenly burst into life again, so it won't be long before I forget about tidying the study and have to get outside to cut the grass. In the church calendar we have just had Easter, and the story of the crucifixion, followed by the great celebration of Easter day when we acknowledge that Jesus has, in fact, overcome death by coming back to life.

The other thing for me about Spring is that it brings a ray of **hope**. I have a friend who every year just before Spring arrives heads off to the mountains in Switzerland to enjoy a week of skiing. For him, the arrival of Spring is not always welcomed, particularly if it arrives early. For most of us however the coming of Spring invokes feelings of joy and hope that the weather will be better, we can get out more in the evenings, and the grey damp and sunless days will be over. Indeed, if you suffer from Seasonal Affective Disorder Spring is very much a time of hope that things will be better. For those of us who follow Jesus, whatever the circumstances we find ourselves in, there is always the triumph of hope over despair.

In reality, my favourite season is Autumn, with the beauty and colour it brings, but I also love Spring because it can be a time of light, life, and hope.

May God bless you as we begin to enjoy Spring.

Extracts from The Messenger – April 2024

"People are surprised to see a DJ in a clerical collar"

A vicar from Tetbury is using his love for music to share God's love through DJing at festivals and events. The Revd Steve Bullock shares how he developed his 'musical ministry' and the reactions he gets from listeners.



The Revd Steve Bullock was ordained priest in June 2023 and is serving his curacy in the benefice of Tetbury, Long Newnton, Beverston and Shipton Moyne. Steve is also a trained DJ, who goes by the name 'Rev Steve'.

Steve says, "I have a musical background, classically trained as a clarinet and piano player from an early age and a member of a high-performing church choir, I appreciate all this genre has to offer. However, over the years I have found that other genres of music have helped me connect with God also, especially different styles of dance music.

"This eventually drew me into exploring how I could get hold of such music and play around with it, to help me and others connect with God, through the spirituality which is often found in such music. This led me to get hold of my first DJ decks and I have been steadily developing my skillset, undertaking courses and being mentored by Mark Spence from DJ Gym, Birmingham, to get to the standard I'm at today."

Steve is mindful of the songs he plays and that his music brings joy.

"I prefer not to play at parties and weddings, as the music is usually dictated by the audience rather than the DJ and it is harder to keep watch of the content of the messages in the songs. This is important as I want my mixes to be positive and pointing towards joy and hope. In fact, at one of my gigs last year, I was playing in a back room, with another DJ playing in the other space. It was noted there was a difference between what we played. Someone noticed that there was a contrast between light and dark, which I thought proved what I try to do with the music.

"So far, I've had some great feedback to my mixes and mini gigs. People are usually surprised to see me wearing my clerical collar, which immediately gets people's attention. I'm one for trying to debunk stereotypes and if I can use it to make people think more about Christ, wherever they are, that is great."

Bream C of E celebrating 'good' results for first time in 22 years

Bream Church of England Primary School, near Lydney, has been awarded a 'good' rating across all areas in its latest Ofsted inspection. Under new headteacher Nicky Brice, it's progressed rapidly since the last inspection in 2019 where the school was rated 'inadequate'. This is the first time in 22 years the school has been judged to be 'good'.

In 2021, the school joined the Severn Federation Academy Trust, led by Trust CEO Rachel Dare, with Louisa Davies as Chair of the Board of Trustees. Nicky Brice took on the post of headteacher, coming to the role from Aylburton Primary. Since this time the school has rapidly improved in all areas.



She said, "We are all so proud of our children who show such a love for this school and enthusiasm for their learning, the staff who have worked tirelessly and for all of our families for their ongoing support and backing throughout this rapid journey of improvement."

Jane Borgeaud, the Diocesan Director of Education, said, "The transformation that has been achieved for this school, as a result of the staff's dedication and ambition, enables its pupils to live out the school's vision, being the best that they can be and growing from acorns to oaks, flourishing in God's love."

payment of the annual subscription (£8 per person or £12 for a couple), or if you can't be there but would like to join you can pay at any of our forthcoming events. After the AGM, our next event will be our annual bring-and-buy Plant Sale and Coffee Morning, in Brimpsfield Village Hall on Saturday 27th April; coffee and cake (and plant stall browsing) will be available from 10.30am, with plant sales starting at 11.00am sharp. There is often a very interesting range of plants available, so it's well worth coming and having a look! Everyone is welcome, member or not.

April is the height of the spring blossom season, with Friday 26th April designated as Orchard Blossom Day across the country. Did you know that there are 157 Gloucestershire apple varieties recorded, although only 86 are still known to exist, and around 100 perry pear varieties? The Gloucestershire Orchard Trust works to save and restore the county's remaining orchards, some of which are likely to be open that weekend to visitors so that you can admire the show. Or you could do your own local version of the Japanese tradition of enjoying cherry blossom at this time of year, either at a garden such as Batsford Arboretum or just looking out for particularly fine flowering cherries in your local town or village. Better still, you could plant a blossom tree in your own garden, to enjoy year after year!

Notes from the Chair

The Parish Council met on 4th March.

Playing Field - The subject of new play equipment, particularly for younger children was discussed as well as siting of benches. Council also considered **its biodiversity obligation and how to enhance the environment around the field** (particularly it is quite likely that many trees will have to be felled). Council would welcome views of parishioners on all these subjects.

Highways - The Council agreed to contact Gloucestershire Highways via our County Councillor with complaints about road surfaces and potholes in three specific areas in the Parish, as well as a request for a high kerb to be installed by Pound Cottage.

Allotments - Most of the rent arrears have been paid. There are 7 allotments in Church Close and 2 on the Playing Field. Soon we will be contacting all allotment holders to confirm they wish to continue with them and see if there are any spare, which will be offered to parishioners first.

Grants - The Council approved a grant of £750 towards the upkeep of the Churchyard and £500 to the Tennis Club to encourage juniors to play by giving coaching. Both grants from next year's budget.

Village assets - The noticeboard opposite the School has been reinstated, but was badly damaged by being left lying out in the rain. Hopefully it can be repaired and National Grid have agreed to pay towards that.

Village tidy up day - This year Saturday April 6th 10am Village Hall.

The Council also agreed to purchase some litter pickers.

Elections - May 2nd - A reminder again of Parish and District elections are being held. Are you interested in becoming a Councillor and serving your community? Please get in touch for details.

Ebworth

Spring, spring, spring! I heard my first singing chiffchaff of the year from my garden in Stroud on the 6th March. For me they are the heralds of the start of spring. As I write this in Mid-March the lesser celandines, and sweet violets are all in full flower. The resident songbirds are starting to hold territories and are singing their hearts out and buff-tailed bumble bee queens, freshly emerged from hibernation are foraging on the celandines.

Our woodland management works have dragged on this year but are now finished and all the footpaths are open. Thank you for your patience whilst the works were ongoing. I am now looking forward to seeing the rides bursting into life with a flush of wildflowers and the invertebrates they support. We will be doing flora and butterfly surveys along the new rides to monitor these changes.

Our method of continuous cover forestry can be quite complicated. We often have to mark trees for contractors so we can maintain the irregular structure so important to this type of management. As you have a walk around Ebworth you may have noticed the confusing array of different paint marks on the trees. Here is an explanation of what all these marks mean.

Pink dot:

This pink spot means that the tree is due to be felled for one of two reasons. The tree could be dead or dying and leaning over a path. Making it potentially dangerous to visitors. We regularly check our trees next to paths and properties and quickly remove any dodgy looking trees. The other reason is that the tree is due to be felled as part of our thinning and ride creation habitat works. Removing a proportion of the trees breaks up the canopy and lets light onto the woodland floor. This stimulates the growth of young trees and woodland wildflowers. It also creates the sunny conditions for creatures like butterflies to thrive.



The trees which remain are given more space to spread out and develop healthy, diverse crowns.

Blue dot:

Special trees which we want protected are given a blue dot. These might be rarer species in the woodland such as oak and elm, or trees which are growing very straight and will produce amazing timber for furniture making.

Blue line (or blaze):

These mark the edges of what are called "permanent extraction racks". These are areas which the forestry contractors are allowed to drive their machinery. Working from these areas to process timber. This means that only small areas of the woodland floor are driven on and it's the same areas every time. This limits compaction of the soil around the tree roots and damage to woodland plants.

White ring:

These are very special trees which have been selected by forestry scientists at

Future Trees. The trees have been selected for their very straight trunks which will produce exceptional timber for furniture making. Cuttings and seed have been taken from these trees to produce a source of trees with straight growth forms and are therefore excellent timber trees. This will allow hardwood timber to be sustainably grown in the UK using sensitive Continuous Cover Forestry techniques. There are three of these trees around Ebworth. Can you find them all?



Blue line with a number:



These trees are part of a long-term study of growth rate. The girths of the trees are measured at the high of the blue line. This allows us to work out how quickly they are growing and how climatic conditions affect their growth. The first measurements were taken in 1957 so we have some really good long-term data.

Cranham Common News

With the winter work on the common completed, we can now enjoy spring days and the beauty of the common and all its resident flora and fauna.

Adders

By the time you read this Nigel Hand will have given his presentation at the CCT AGM about adders, and we will report on this in the next magazine.

With the warmer weather adders appear on sunny days. They usually bask close to bramble patches so they can retreat for safety. Many people worry about the adders, but adder:people interactions are very rare and many long standing residents have never yet seen an adder. It is safe to walk around the common, but a sensible precaution is to wear walking boots and stick to the paths.

PLEASE KEEP DOGS UNDER CONTROL and out of bramble patches. Dogs that disturb adders are at risk of being bitten.

In the unlikely event of adder bites human or pet, you should seek medical attention.

Skylarks

Skylarks will soon be returning to the common from their winter migration. They are ground nesting birds that nest in the longer areas of grass. This makes them susceptible to disturbance by dogs, so another reason for keeping dogs close and out of the long grass. They generally like to nest in the long grass below the old cricket pitch.

Butterfly Transects

NE have now recruited volunteers and completed their training, and the butterfly population will be monitored weekly from now until the autumn.

Amazing progress has been made on the refurbishment of The Black Horse which is approximately 80% complete as I write in early March. The ground floor bar, toilets and cellar are decorated and have floor coverings completed, with just final fixtures and fittings required. New aluminium windows have been fitted to the front elevation with new PVC windows fitted to all other areas. On the first floor we await the arrival of a commercial extraction canopy for the new kitchen equipment which includes a 10-grid combination oven and commercial pass-through dishwasher.

Nick and his team have gone above and beyond to resolve unforeseen issues, the Committee are very fortunate to have such a talented - and patient at times - builder! The final push is well underway with discussions around curtain fabric and cushions a sure sign that The Black Horse will be opening very soon.

We know that Joey, Karina and Paul aka "The Waypoint" (our new tenants) will be keen to open as soon as they can after the build is completed .

They have great understanding of the history of the Black Horse and want to preserve and respect that very special atmosphere of an historic local pub nestled in the heart of the village, but that also serves the greater community.

They have advised us that the likely advertised opening times will be much in line with other local pubs in the area and will be as follows:





Gloucestershire Constabulary is warning residents of a fraud threat targeting our county. Eighteen reports have been received from Gloucestershire residents within the past few weeks in relation to this telephone scam.

In each case, the fraudster telephoned the victim purporting to be an officer of either the police, HMRC, or victim's bank. They informed the victim that their bank account had been subjected to fraud and they urgently needed to transfer all their money into a "safe bank account". One local resident - age 83 - lost £15,000 to this scam. Victims without online or mobile banking were asked to purchase gift cards, or even send cash in the post.

This fraud method is known as "courier fraud" and is perpetrated by organised crime groups targeting the elderly. The average victim of courier fraud in Gloucestershire is 79 years old and will lose £11,000.







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
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
