A Letter from The Clergy



ASH WEDNESDAY AND ST. VALENTINE'S DAY

This year 2024, Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, and St. Valentine's Day fall on the same day – February 14th. A happy coincidence?

Ash Wednesday makes us think of penitence and giving things up while St. Valentine's Day concentrates upon love and romance. These two seem, somehow, to be opposites but are they really so opposed one to another? I would suggest that they have more in common than meets the eye!

Ash Wednesday is the first day of the 40 days and 40 nights of Lent when we think of the time Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His earthly ministry – a ministry of love which transformed the world. Unexpected youth club thriving in Gloucester

When Gloucester City deanery started focusing on new ways to engage with secondary-aged young people, they had no idea that within a year God would give them what they needed to start a thriving and expanding youth club.



At the start of 2023, Barrie Voyce, Senior Youth Connector for the Diocese of Gloucester, visited the deanery to help them think around ways to connect with youth and teenagers in their area. Together, they hit upon the idea of ensuring that the excellent relationships the church has with primary school children were not lost as they got older. The deanery decided to prioritise being there for the Year 6s as they dealt with all the challenges of transition and ensuring that they had a safe space to meet with their friends.

Inspired by this idea, the Revd Rachel Beck, Vicar of Gloucester St George's Tuffley, paid particular attention to a couple of Year 6 children who came along to their church's family drop-in and attended the summer holiday club.

Led by Laine Lewis, ordinand on placement, the church invited them back for games, chat and doughnuts on Monday evenings in September. The initial plan was to trial a group for four weeks, chat to the three or four children they'd invited and see if there was an appetite to meet more often going forward.

Barrie says, "What started out as a simple conversation with the deanery about connecting with teens in our parishes has grown into something much bigger. Showing these young people that the church cares about them and wants to provide for their needs has seen the group of young people grow and grow! It's fascinating to see how God has worked through the personal invitation given to these children to speak to ever-growing numbers of young people."

Every week, more and more II-I4-year-olds turned up – the original group inviting their friends and those inviting more. For an hour each Monday evening, the church hall is full of youth playing games, making things and chatting to the encouraged, if slightly surprised, volunteers.

Rachel says, "We've accidentally started a youth group! We are full of praise and thanksgiving to God for this, of course, and are very excited by it, whilst also having a few challenges and questions about how to sustain it and help the young people as they develop in faith."

In the candlelight, quietly, we sang 'Away in a Manger' – perhaps our last carol of the Christmas season this year.

In memory of Dorothy Vowell who died on Christmas Day 2023 aged 103

Dorothy was born at Hilltop in Cranham on 15th Dec 1920, her parents were Bert and Rhoda Hannis, Their small holding was the field that is now Cranham Cricket Club. A few years later the family moved down hill, purchasing a plot of land on which they built a bungalow today known as Brackenhurst.

Dorothy's best friend was Kitty Daniels nee Gyde, Dorothy often told the tale of an event that took place during WW2, when returning from a shopping expedition to buy new shoes, they were caught in an avalanche of shrapnel, and as they took shelter in the woods, the safety of the new pair of shoes rather than their own that was uppermost in their minds.

Dorothy met her husband Alf during WW2 when he was stationed at Cranham corner, to man the guns at Brotheridge. The couple married on 26th Dec 1941, they would have liked to set up home in Cranham, but post war restrictions, and a shortage of building materials put paid to their plans to build a home on the Knoll. The couple moved to Stonehouse with their two daughters Wendy and Barbara.

Dorothy has been a great asset to Cranham History Society researchers, with her memories and identifying photographs etc. Dorothy always loved coming back to Cranham to visit, especially Cranham Feast every year. Dorothy was a great knitter, and over many years has raised a great deal of money for charities with her knitting. She was responsible for many of the poppies that decorate Cranham church each remembrance day.

Winter scrub management

We have run two successful work parties this winter, and collectively cleared some dense areas of scrub on both sides of the road up to the Knoll. The brush cutting team have also been hard at work controlling the spread of bramble patches.

These work parties are essential for maintaining the optimal balance of grass and scrub for the benefit of all flora and fauna, and every pair of hands enables us to achieve more.

There are two more workparties in February so please make a note of the dates and come and join us if you can.

Butterfly Transects

There are other ways to get involved in the common. Natural England would like to invite a small number of volunteers to undertake regular walks over the common counting butterflies, to help monitor the butterfly populations. Training will be given.

If this is something you are interested in, contact Liz Hayden (details on next page) and I will put you in touch with Jesper Knapton (NE) to find out more about what it involves.

Could you help support bees and butterflies by planting a wildflower area in your garden?

As we anticipate the return of spring and thoughts of garden planting are beginning to take shape, everyone is invited to support an initiative to create wildflower areas in gardens. Collectively our gardens make up a huge area of land and if everyone could dedicate a small area to wildflowers it could create a very large area of nectar resources for bees and butterflies. This is part of a bigger initiative to create wildlife corridors to join up isolated populations of wildlife throughout Gloucestershire and support connectivity between conservation sites.

Natural England are offering wildflower seed harvested from the common available for anyone in the village to plant in their own garden.

How to plant wild flower areas

This is mixed seed from the common so will contain a mix of local native species of flowers possibly with some grasses.

It can be planted in a pot, on bare soil or in an established lawn. To plant in established lawn you need to scarify the grass intensively to expose bare areas before sowing the seed, and then roll or tread the seed into the soil. Seed can be sown at any time from now until April.

Please note that wildflowers thrive in poor, unimproved soils so they are not likely to thrive in ground that has been fertilised or spread with compost or manure.

News from The Friends of the Black Horse Cranham Ltd. January 2024



The Friends of The Black Horse Cranham Ltd. Management Committee wish all our community a very Happy 2024.

What a way to start this year! The interior building works are storming ahead and the exterior volunteer led works are making incredible progress to clear and maximise the car park and the gardens, improving accessibility to the pub. At the moment a lot of this work has been quite physical but there will be plenty of opportunities to offer your skills, whether that's growing plants, gardening, painting, making soft furnishings and goodness knows how many other jobs. We will let you know, have no fear! We are really seeing what is possible when our community works together.

Building update from Mark Donaldson

Stroud based Qubit Construction were appointed on December 4th 2023 to undertake the refurbishment works after a competitive tender process was completed.

Work then commenced on 11th December with the isolation and strip out of plumbing and electrics. Ceilings, floors and walls have been removed and opened up to allow for a full electrical re-wire and fire alarm to be installed. ensuring the building is safe and compliant. We have engaged with a structural engineer to identify areas requiring attention including the cellar ceiling joists, first floor stairs and bar/lounge wall. Over the following weeks The Black Horse will see new lime plaster to the walls in the bar. internal repointing of exposed stonework and new windows throughout. Ensuring the fabric of The Black Horse is preserved and restored, has always been a key priority in the decision-making process and we look forward to welcoming everyone back to The Black Horse in Spring 2024.







Volunteering Progress Report from Dave Tibbles

A Black Horse Volunteers Group WhatsApp was set up in November which has now grown to 63. There have been 5 sessions so far. We started with the gable ends of the pub being cleared of ivy shortly followed by the removal of all the furniture ready for construction to get started.

Some of the dry stone walling around the pub needed to be rebuilt, so this was taken down and stacked nearby, ready for rebuilding. Part of the walling has been removed permanently along the pathway to the first floor in order to establish an easy accessible entrance to the restaurant area from road level. This aligns with our commitment to improving access to all. Rebuilding of the dry stone walling has already begun.

Good progress has also been made in the car park. The free use of a digger and dumper has enabled us to increase the number of parking spaces by clearing earth and undergrowth from the edges of the car park and all the dislodged kerb stones around the perimeter have now been reset.







Undergrowth surrounding the pub has also been removed or reduced and we can now see the lay of the land immediately around the pub. This work has spawned all sorts of ideas from our volunteers to help us evolve plans for more sessions over the coming months.

We have also had some requests to organise mid-week sessions which we would like to get going on soon. If you would like to be added to the group

Our government funding and community investment will be fully utilised in the building work described above so we are in the process of searching out more grants to fund further internal and external improvements. This includes an additional project enabling wheelchair access and purchasing internal and external furnishings. Our available budget can be increased by more of the community joining The Friends of the Black Horse Cranham Limited or existing members purchasing additional shares at £50 a share. **Please email:**

Brimpsfield & Mid-Cotswold Garden Society

The Garden Society's Saturday coffee mornings start again on 3rd February with a talk by Sally Oates on the Stroud Seed Bank, a not-for-profit organisation that collects seed locally and makes it available to gardeners in return for a small donation. Come and learn how to save seed and preserve varieties suited to our local conditions! As usual, the talk will be in Brimpsfield Village Hall, with coffee and home-made cake available at a modest cost from 10.30am and the talk starting at 11am; everyone is welcome!

The earliest snowdrops were in bloom before New Year this winter, and by the time you read this there should be good displays across the Cotswolds. We are fortunate in this part of the country to have several fine snowdrop gardens on our doorstep, with the opportunity to spend a day out admiring carpets of these seasonal blooms, as well as other early spring-flowering plants. Painswick Rococo Garden is open every day in February and Colesbourne Park is open at weekends through the month; Cotswold Farm opens on Mondays, and for the National Garden Scheme on the weekend of 17th-18th, and other National Garden Scheme openings include Downton House, Painswick, on Mon/Tues 5th-6th, and Trench Hill, Sheepscombe, on Sundays 11th and 18th. Times, prices and any last-minute changes (be sure to check if the weather is bad!) can be found online.

If your snowdrops need dividing, do this once the flowers have died down but while the leaves are still green, as they will re-establish most successfully that way. You can replant the bulbs, more widely spaced out, to make a more impressive display, and pot up any surplus to give away to friends and neighbours – they are always a welcome gift!

Ebworth

We had some wild and windy weather over Christmas which meant post storm checks of our trees. Thankfully we had very little trees blown over which will be down to the excellent management the woodlands at Ebworth has had over the last hundred years. The regular thinning's have given the trees space to grow and develop healthy crowns and root systems.

We have completed the planting of 500m of new hedge row on Overtown Farm. Planting more than 3000 native tree and scrub species of 16 different species! A big thank you to Cranham Beaver Scouts who helped us plant some



of those trees. We were also helped by groups from Cotswold Outdoors, Tony Gee civil engineers and of course our regular group of volunteers. The new hedgerows will provide excellent protection and food for wildlife and will also give shelter to the livestock on the farm. You can see one of the new hedgerows from the public bridleway which runs above Old Overtown Farmhouse.

Big flocks of fieldfare, redwing and common gull can be seen feeding on the fields of Overtown Farm. They will be looking for invertebrates in the organic soils and animal dung. We have also had a report of a lone lapwing joining the fieldfares. It's always worth looking out for golden plover at this time of year and there is also a striking, very pale buzzard about.

The woodland ride creation and thinning works are still ongoing in Workmans Wood so please do follow any safety signs, diversions or instructions from contractors.

Painswick Community Library

Painswick Community Library is in the centre of Painswick in the large, first-floor room up the stairs at the Town Hall. The library is run entirely by volunteers, as distinct from the bigger libraries operated by the County Council, such as Stroud and Cheltenham, although most of our funding is provided by the council.

We are lucky still to have both, because many public libraries have been closed, due to cut-backs. The library is worth investigating, if you haven't already dropped in and registered for a library card. There is an extensive collection of fiction and crime novels (some in large print), smaller reference, poetry, local interest and biographical sections, plus a thriving children's section, with books suitable for children just learning to read to young teens.

Our New Books committee keeps a ready supply of new publications available, often following recommendations made by our readers. The library supports its own book club, a writers' group and various other activities, such as weekly 'story time' readings for young children. Users are welcome to drop in during opening hours, to browse the bookshelves, use the two public access PCs and the free WiFi, or read the newspapers and magazines on display including The Painswick Beacon, Village Voice and Cranham Village Magazine etc.

Comfortable armchairs are provided. We don't offer tea or coffee, but you can bring your own. There are WCs downstairs. Free parking is usually available in Stamages car park, only a few minutes' walk away. There are even a few free spaces outside the Town Hall (1-hour limit) and the Town Hall's small car park behind can be useful for readers with mobility difficulties (with a stairlift inside for access to the library). It is also worth noting that the library is plugged into the county's interlibrary loan system. If we don't have the book you are after, we can find it in any of the other 34 libraries have it available, to order it to be delivered to Painswick for you to collect and return. There is also an app to register your details on-line, select Painswick as your preferred location, and then search for books yourself by name, author or subject-matter, after which you will be prompted by email once the book has arrived, and reminded again when it's due for return.

Let's face it; we have all collected books over the years that now take up too much space at home. It's a lot easier to use the library and it's free! (apart from small charges to use the photocopier and laminator).



Money Advice

I've built up a bit of debt and I am panicking.

Even though I cut back, Christmas was expensive, my spending has gone up and what I have coming in just doesn't stretch as far as it used to. What can I do?



First of all it's important to know you're not alone in finding things difficult, and crucially there is support available.

The first step is to **collect all the information you have about your debts,** this might include contracts, bills and statements.

Next, make a list of your debts and write down the details of each. This could include who you owe the money to (this person or company is your 'creditor'); when you first missed a payment; and how much you now owe. You'll also need to make a note of your account or reference number and what steps the creditor has taken to get the money back, eg. sending you letters.

It might feel overwhelming when you see all of your debts written down - but try not to worry, the important thing is that you are sorting them out.

If you are behind on household bills, prioritise paying your rent or mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax first. Not paying these bills has the most serious consequences. You should speak to the person or company you owe money to, to see if there are any manageable steps you can take to start reducing your debt.

Once you've got these debts under control, you should look at any other debts like credit card or store card debts, payday loans or missed Buy Now Pay Later payments.

While you are looking at money going out, do remember to consider money that could be coming in. It's always worth checking if there are any benefits that you are entitled to, including support with your energy and living costs. There's a benefits calculator, advice on how to reduce living costs and information on other ways to increase your income, plus further advice on dealing with debts, on the Citizens Advice website – www.citizensadvice.org.uk

There is also emergency support that you may be able to access, such as a food bank or fuel vouchers. You could also contact your local council to see if they can offer support.

We know that times are incredibly tough but please remember, you don't have to face this alone. 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
