An Easter message from Bishop Rachel

In January, I unintentionally sparked media interest in my criticism of major stores putting Easter eggs on the shelves during the days of Christmas. Yet as retailers lurch from mince pies to Easter eggs, I do of course want to encourage people to live and



As we journey towards the suffering of the cross and beyond to the joy of the empty tomb, I wonder how well we encourage people to join the dots, not simply in a story with sequential chapters but as a mystery to be entered into as we live the laughter and tears of life.

Christmas, Good Friday and Easter reveal the truth that the light of Jesus Christ cannot be overcome by the darkness, and that the love and life of God is stronger than even death itself.

Strangely, the retailers don't seem to encourage us to look beyond Easter to Ascension Day and Pentecost, yet amid the celebration and pain of life these next dates are vital landmarks as we seek to live life in all its fulness as offered us in Jesus Christ, sharing the resurrection hope of Easter through the power of the Holy Spirt at work within us and around us.

May our hearts be expectant and hope filled as we walk the coming days.

#### **Brimpsfield & Mid-Cotswold Garden Society**

The speaker at our next coffee morning meeting, on Saturday 2nd March, will be Caroline Sheldrick, a qualified medical herbalist, who will tell us about Medicinal Herbs in the Garden; we look forward to

learning how to grow our own remedies! We meet in Brimpsfield Village Hall; coffee and home-made cake will be available from 10.30am, with the talk starting at 11.00am; why not come along?

March can be a tricky month in the garden; as the days lengthen and the weather slowly warms up, many of us will be keen to start preparing our gardens for what we hope will be a colourful and productive year. However, don't forget that it's not uncommon for there to be a cold snap in March, and there are often gales around the spring equinox. Wise gardeners will keep an eye on the weather forecast and, if necessary, be ready to protect anything not fully hardy, or recently planted or prone to wind damage; it may be safer to wait until later in the month before sowing seeds, no matter what it says on the packet. There are still things to do in the garden, though.

If you have delayed cutting back perennials to allow wildlife to shelter there over the winter, this is the month to tidy up, so that the new shoots have space to come through, and to give slugs and snails fewer places to hide. It's the last chance to prune roses and deciduous trees such as apples and pears (not plums or cherries), and shrubs such as buddleia which flower in late summer; leave those that flower earlier until after the flowers have faded. It's also a good time to mulch the soil, provided that the ground isn't frozen or too dry. And don't forget to water your pots if we get a dry spell!

#### The Cranham Village Hall

Today as I write, it is Valentine's Day, a day when people express their affection. With some sentimentality, I'd like to share my affection for the bricks and mortar that we know as our Village Hall.



The main building was originally a pottery built by the Lovegrove family in 1832, with its use changed to be a place of Worship in 1930 and becoming the Village Hall in 1977.

As the Village Hall, these bricks and mortar have welcomed many to share times of happy celebration with parties & weddings, sad celebration at memorial gatherings, played host & venue for societies and committees to meet, held concerts, quiz nights and many community social occasions. Parents and grandparents have taken a seat and watched their little ones first nativity.

#### **Ebworth**

Rain, rain, rain during February. What a wet month it has been. With our thin soils and free draining limestone bedrock we generally avoid the worst of the wet ground, but this winter has been particularly bad. Making access difficult and out working in it miserable. No one likes putting on yesterday's wet kit!

The bedrock and soil conditions give Ebworth its character. They are thin, meaning there is little available nutrients. Free draining, meaning they can dry out very quickly in summer, and have a high pH, making them very alkali. This all creates a very extreme environment for plants to grow.

On the grasslands this means that vigorous grasses and plants like nettles and brambles can't dominate because they need high levels of nutrients and more moderate soil conditions. This leaves space for the specialist calcareous grassland plants which have evolved to tolerate these conditions. They are usually quite small and delicate and easily smothered by thicker vegetation.

In the woodlands the soil conditions determine the suite of plant species which grows. From the delicate ground flora to the towering canopy trees. The plant species determines what invertebrates can be found in an area as most are highly specialised. The Cotswolds are famous for their butterflies which are generally restricted to one or two "larval food plants". The plants their caterpillars eat.

At this time of year, I tire of winter and always look forward to spring. And on the sunny days it feels like it is just around the corner. The birds have been singing and it won't be long until we hear the first chiffchaff of the year. As I write this on valentines day I have already seen blackthorn and willow in flower. The snow drops are out, and the odd lesser celandine is in flower. Not long to go until spring!

#### Cranham Common News

Winter management on the common is now complete and the common is in excellent condition ready for the growing season. The grass has been grazed by cows and sheep leaving a balance of longer and shorter areas that provide varied habitats for different wildlife to thrive. A lot of scrub management has been carried out by both Natural England and by our village volunteers on four workparties. This has included bramble management by the brush cutting team, roadside scrub clearance on the road up to the Knoll, and cutting back of blackthorn spread in the gulley on Knowle Bank. It is time to sit back and enjoy the common as spring approaches.

#### **Adder Presentation by Nigel Hand**

At the CCT AGM on **Saturday 23rd March, 10.00am** in the Village Hall. Adder expert Nigel Hand will give a presentation on the behaviour and movements of the radio tracked resident and A417 translocated snakes on the Common. Learn about the adders and ask questions. This time of the year adders appear on sunny days emerging from winter hibernation. They usually bask close to bramble patches so they can retreat for safety. Many people worry about the adders, but adder/people interactions are very rare and many long standing residents have never yet seen an adder. It is safe to walk around the common, but a sensible precaution is to wear walking boots and stick to the paths.

**PLEASE KEEP DOGS UNDER CONTROL** and out of bramble patches. Dogs that disturb adders are at risk of being bitten. In the unlikely event of adder bites human or pet, you should seek medical attention.

#### **Skylarks**

Skylarks will soon be returning to the common from their winter migration. They are ground nesting birds that nest in the longer areas of grass. This makes them susceptible to disturbance by dogs, so another reason for keeping dogs close and out of the long grass.

#### **Butterfly Transects**

Natural England are looking for a small number of volunteers to undertake regular walks over the common counting butterflies, to help monitor the butterfly populations. Training will be given.

If this is something you are interested in, contact Liz Hayden (details below) and I will put you in touch with Jesper Knapton (NE) to find out more about what it involves.

#### Wildflower Seed

There is still a small amount of wildflower seed harvested from the common available for people to plant in their gardens. Contact Liz Hayden if you would like some.

# Tudor Swearing, Sex and Loos: the Naughty Bits not seen in Historical Dramas

A talk given to the Cranham Local History Society on 25th January 2024 by Kirstie Bingham

The latest talk presented the writer with a few problems. How will you describe it, I was asked by people at the meeting. Kirstie, our speaker, didn't hold back.

It's best if I set the scene as she did, with the fifteenth-century merchant's house in Tewkesbury, part of the John Moore Museum, where Kirstie is the Heritage Manager. To the front a shop, a workshop out back, living space including kitchen in between — and one room upstairs, where the parents would have a double bed, a four-poster so it could be hung with screens, and the children, who could be many, on trundle or similar beds on the floor. Sex went on behind the screen. You relieved yourself in a piss pot in the bedroom.

The title of the talk includes 'swearing' and 'loos' as well as sex, but sex does seem to have informed almost everything. The formal break with the church of Rome came in 1533 but restrictions it laid down would have held sway well beyond that date. Sex was encouraged (abstinence could lead to melancholy) but not on feast days or saints' days, not during Lent, and not it seems on Wednesdays and Fridays, as well as Saturdays or Sundays. There were guidelines to correct positions for sexual activity which I won't outline here. Also, notions regarding sexual appetites. Girls could marry as young as 12, boys at 14. Aphrodisiacs included leeks and onions, and apples (which had tempted Eve of course), oysters and spices. Pepper could inflame the body. Contraception was outlawed but widely practised. Quite how, and how successful, isn't for this report.

As for cleanliness, soap was made from animal fat and ashes. Water shouldn't be too hot, it could open you up to sickness, to bad air known as miasma. You didn't empty your piss pots out of the window: you could sell the contents to the dye-worker or tanner. Nightsoilmen: their name described their function. They emptied the pit and spread it over the fields. As for swearwords, 'a plague on your house' had a very real resonance back them. Likewise, a swearword invoking God or Jesus. Make-up had been frowned on under Henry VII but Queen Elizabeth would cover her face with a foundation made from white lead and vinegar, with red ochre giving a rosy grow. Ordinary working folk couldn't of course aspire to lighter skin.

Kirstie moved on to tell us about the preferred sizes of anatomical parts, about suggestive postures, and codpieces. One's nose rather than other appendages was suggestive of sexual potency. Witches (the witch craze was taking hold about this time) were also involved in nefarious practices. Nothing escaped, even the badges worn by pilgrims were sexualised. So too were daggers, with their hilts carved in suggestive shapes. And flowers. Orchids are named from the Greek word for the shape of the root, and the different kinds of orchids have sexualised names. A question from the audience raised concerns about possible harmful effects on local morality of the orchids on the Common.

For more explicit detail than that given in this report, readers will have to do their own research, or catch up with Kirstie when she's speaking at another venue. We do owe her a big vote of thanks. She took us places we hadn't expected to visit. She made it informative – and always found the lighter side.

#### PLEASE CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR DOG







Did you know that an average sized dog produces 146 kg of poo per year?

Failing to clean up after your dog is not only antisocial, it can also have serious health consequences especially for children.

Dogs may carry small worms in their poo that can cause toxocariasis. Humans are not infected by contact with fresh dog poo. They catch the infection by ingesting worm eggs that have been in the soil for weeks or months. Ingested eggs and the larvae that hatch from them usually pass through the gut without causing symptoms. However, on rare occasions worms can pass into other organs and cause problems such as asthma or blindness.

It is, therefore, especially important not to leave dog poo in places where young children play, such as the village playing field.
